Worship in the Chet Valley

You will be warmly welcomed to any of our services. We hope to provide worship to suit everybody.

- <u>Holy Communion</u> is celebrated every Sunday at one or other of the churches in the Benefice, either Book of Common Prayer or Common Worship, with an informal Holy Communion service once a month in Chedgrave.

THE SISLAND CHRONICLE

We have a new hedge in Sisland churchyard, planted in the late winter and established with the help of the spring rains. Remember them?! - But the sandy soil, together with the unaccustomed 'Balmy days of summer' put it under stress, and with no mains water, we had to resort to a water tank – kindly provided and kept filled by farmer John – and buckets (15 every other day) - to keep the young hedge growing. The water soon attracted some of the local wildlife including the resident moles which started tunnelling operations under the young trees! Water is vital to all life, and in a dry churchyard (except for a dogs bowl) it soon became obvious that it was much appreciated, particularly by various insects which came to the tank to drink from the damp wood. Wasps, bees of several sorts, and hornets, also Meadow Brown, Brimstone and large white butterflies, and an opportunist wren who grabbed a spider (not an insect) that had unfortunately decided that this was a good place to spread his- or her net. So adversity had a happy ending for most after all, and our hedge is rapidly growing healthy new shoots.

Hi – FREDDIE here – I was supposed to go to the Strawberry tea at John and Jill's farm – but T. said it was far too hot – so I stayed indoors in the cool. When J. came home she said she had met Demi again, and that her family had brought her a car – so she could see the bunnies as they drive along! 'Who is this Demi'? I hear you ask. She's a very distant relation – a Jack Russell x Patterdale terrier cross, and J. says she is cute – for goodness sake, I ask you, whatever next! Now I wonder if I can persuade T. to buy that old Land Rover we saw the other day – it might be worth a try. I eat up all my greens! (T. showed me how to pod peas - really tasty). Cheers F. SISLANDA

Playing Field Official Opening: Hamish Carrie officially opened the revamped playing field at a celebration held on Saturday 18th August. Hamish's uncle, Douglas Thomson, donated the money for the purchase of the playing field so that children in the village had somewhere to play. We also received support from Masala Garden who provided food and a bar whilst Loddon Parish Council kindly assisted with the provision of marquees for the event. A raffle in aid of Break Charity was held and Mini Kicks Norwich provided extra sporting entertainment for children attending the event.

Road Safety: Unfortunately speeding remains a serious problem on the Old Yarmouth Road. Volunteers are organising a speed watch scheme and there has been a good response to this. It is hoped that this will educate drivers going through the village about the danger they are causing to pedestrians and other road users.

Holy Trinity Bellringers

The ringers have been very busy over the past two months. As well as Sunday services, we have rung to celebrate five weddings and a blessing that have taken place at Holy Trinity.



We rang two Quarter Peals at Loddon on both consecutive days of the Open gardens weekend in June, and another two at Norton Subcourse and Woodton the same weekend. We have attended local monthly practices held at St. Michael's, Beccles and at St. Mary's, Bungay. We hosted the ringers from St. Peter Mancroft in Norwich for an evening on our ten bell simulator and took part in a Quarter Peal of Grandsire Caters with them at Gt. Yarmouth Minster.

A team from Loddon entered and won a Quiz and chips event for the Eastern Branch of the NDA held at Martham. We have also rung Quarter Peals at Norton Subcourse for their open gardens and another as a 30th wedding anniversary compliment for a former tower captain there. Visiting ringers from the University of Surrey society of change ringers came and rang at Holy Trinity on Monday 30th July as part of a ringing tour in the area.

On Wednesday August 1st, members joined around 150 others at the church of St. Peter Mancroft to celebrate the opening and dedication of the new Ringing Discovery Centre by the Bishop of Norwich which has been created in the tower. A new gallery floor has been installed higher up in the tower where the twelve bells are now rung from. This also provides a magnificent view down into the church through a glass screen. A set of eight training bells are positioned under this gallery which are linked to a computer for simulated sound. These will benefit new ringers from all over East Anglia and beyond. Over the next few months, a display of the heritage and history of change ringing in Norwich will be put in place, showing the achievements and innovations that have taken place over the last three hundred years. The whole project has taken three years to complete with money raised by the Mancroft Guild of Ringers and a generous helping from the National Lottery Fund and other charities.

Loddon & District Local History Group

Keeping to the recent tradition of "blazing June "days for our outing, June 20th found us travelling to Earsham for an Historical Tour of the Hall.

After welcome refreshments Annabel, one of the present owners, gave us an entertaining and really interesting tour. The present hall, was built by John Buxton between 1707-1710 beside the earlier house, which still stands though much changed. He had married Ann Gooch and received the house as part of her dower. The Buxtons later sold the house to Col William Windham (the Buxtons had another house at Tibbenham) and after that the ownership became confusing, descending through various branches of the Windham family.

The building has lovely rooms, well suited to family living with lots of history and character. The tour ends in the courtyard of the old Hall where the teashop provided our most luxurious afternoon tea.

A really good afternoon and our thanks to Jan & Christine for all their hard work making the arrangements.

Our monthly talk, on 18th July, was a fascinating insight into life through the eyes of Rev. Benjamin John Armstrong, Vicar of East Dereham from 1850 until his death in 1888. He had kept a diary for 50 years and all 11 handwritten volumes are now in the hands of his great grandson, Chris Armstrong. They have been the source of information for many researchers and two previous books have been published.

As our speaker for the afternoon. Chris told us many details of his family, several of whom had been Parsons. He read extracts from the diaries giving a flavour of life at the time ranging from local events in Norfolk to travels abroad and opinions on world events happening at the time. Although from a very 'well to do' family and often enjoying the 'high life' his Great Grandfather, Benjamin, was also somewhat of a philanthropist and did much for the needy in his Parish especially women in downtrodden situations and the many poor children of the day.

A third book, produced by Chris in 2012 entitled 'Under the Parsons Nose' is available from Jarrolds bookshop or can be ordered from Amazon.

Read Any Good Books Lately?

"The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel," by Deborah Moggach

This was originally published in 2004 with the title of "These Foolish Things," but more recent editions have taken the same title as the film made from the book. It is a highly entertaining story, with some different and additional characters who are not included in the film. Just as the film, at times the book is very funny and, at other times, very touching.

"A Certain Justice," by P.D. James

Written in 1997, when P.D. James was really at her peak, the plot of this mystery story will keep your interest from start to finish. The characters display the author's shrewd observance of details and of humanity's variety. They are so very believable that - of its kind - "A Certain Justice" is

second to none. P.D. James draws on her experiences in the Police Department and the Criminal Policy Department, and her knowledge of literature is really extensive. These things are shown in the way she herself writes.

Adam Dalgleish is one of the most interesting fictional British detectives. He is a multi-faceted man who is shrewd but not hasty; ruthless yet compassionate; understanding but never sentimental; and, of course, he is also a poet. This thriller set among the Law Courts of London, is well worth reading.

"The Beginner's Goodbye," by Anne Tyler

A young man's wife dies in a most unexpected way, and very suddenly. As you read, you learn a lot about the characters of man and wife, and about their marriage. Following his wife's death, Aaron begins to see her now and then. He believes that Dorothy even talks to him, and they have some very prosaic, ordinary conversations which culminate now and again with a few mutual home truths! It's a quirky sort of story - the concept of seeing a loved one after death is not an original one, of course, but the way Anne Tyler has handled it most certainly is. This is a completely unexpected and quite delightful novel.

"The Street Lawyer," by John Grisham

Michael Brock has worked hard and is definitely 'on the way up' until a homeless man with a gun arrives in his place of work. That incident changes things forever for the lawyer. From then on the story is gripping. John Grisham's powers of description help the reader to picture each character with clarity and, in many cases, with real compassion. There are times of tension, excitement and tenderness in the narrative.

The legal background of the book's plot is really interesting - so many different kinds of law departments, and often so complex. As well as being a writer, the author is an attorney, politician and activist in the USA. He has certainly done his homework and researched the plight of the homeless in Washington D.C. as well as the help available to them. The inadequate support given them from the authorities is also made clear. In addition, he shows knowledge of those legal practices which are wealthy and greedy. Good or bad, all of John Grisham's characters are believable. If you choose to read this book, from the very beginning to the final page you may well find it hard to put down!

Nature Notes

Well, what can we say about this summer? The weather was interesting, to say the least. After cold and rain came a Mediterranean style heat wave and then horrendous thunderstorms causing flooding in many areas. Having said that, what a summer it's been for wildlife watching. A couple of years ago we were looking out for our native six spot ladybirds as they were very few and far between. This year I've seen many more than usual.



National Swift week was a great success and many people were inspired to put Swift boxes on their houses to encourage them to make a home next year. Martins were seen

nesting on houses on one of Loddon's new estates and Dragonflies were abundant all over the place.



I have seen many more Banded Demoiselles then ever and have been asked by others what they are as many people had never seen them before. Spoonbills seem to have taken up residence in The Broads and some have even started breeding and the Tern colony on Scolt Head Island has

fared very well.

Perhaps some of you have taken note of the need to leave the mowing and weeding alone and allow the natural world to encroach into your garden again. If so I'm sure you will have been able to see many of our smaller creatures at close quarters. How sad it must be for those with their much promoted 'artificial grass'. It may stay green in the heat but they don't know what they are missing.

Now it's September and who know what our weather will bring? I look forward to a cooler autumn with all the delights of the season. Fruits will have ripened on the trees and as long as the prolonged hot weather has not shrivelled them, there should be a good crop. I've noticed that Oaks, Limes, Sweet Chestnuts and Planes have all flowered well this year. Perhaps, as the saying goes, it's going to be a hard winter or maybe they are so stressed that they are trying to produce more offspring before they die. Trees usually take a long time to give up completely which makes the actual causes of their decline hard to tell.

As autumn arrives and winter approaches please spare a thought for our

hedgehogs. I've had several reports of sightings this summer and hope that perhaps numbers are slowly increasing. Those babies born this year will need to put on substantial amounts of fat before hibernation in order to see them through the months to come. If they are undernourished they will not survive. I fear that



they've suffered during the hot months when the ground has been very dry and worms and slugs, which are their staple food, have been hard to find. Leaving a saucer of a small amount of meaty cat food outside of an evening, during the autumn, will help to supplement their diet and fatten them up.

Gardening Notes

weather was 1976, the year I finished school: I didn't like it then , and I don't like it now. It's just too hot to be able to work out in the sun doing physical work for long periods of time, although as I write this, the weather people talk of it cooling down to normal temperatures with some rain as well. YES! At last.

In 1976 it was hot and dry, and the previous year had also been very dry, with a dry winter as well, so conditions were bad, with water shortages and hose pipe bans everywhere. Fortunately the winter of 2017/18 was very wet and so was the spring, so all the reservoirs and aquifers were brimming full as we went into summer. This means that although our lawns and borders are looking brown and dead, well established perennials and trees are surviving quiet well due to the fact that their roots are deep down and are finding moisture. One good thing is that lawns haven't needed cutting for several weeks. Most lawns will recover given time, but you might find that the finer grasses have died off and you will be left with courser grasses which tend to grow straight up and not along the ground which will leave lots of bare patches. Don't rush to repair your lawn - it will be better to wait for cooler and wetter weather in the autumn.

Vegetable crops have suffered this summer: with the lack of moisture the plants are unable to access nutrients from the soil, so cannot reach their potential, and so they will produce smaller crops. They will mature earlier than normal, this however will give you time to prepare the soil ready to plant onion sets, garlic and spring cabbage plants, ready for next year. When you have any bare soil make sure to keep the soil free from weeds: either hoe the soil frequently or cover it with black plastic or old carpet. As the old boys would say "one years seeding equals seven years weeding"

If you have been able to keep your bedding plants alive with extra watering, well done. It's quite a chore, but the rewards are worth it, but if the plants have died off early it's best to remove them and get ready for autumn bedding plants.

The other problem we had in 1976 was a deluge of rain in the autumn which filled up all the reservoirs but made the ground too wet to work. So be warned - you might need your welly boots yet!
