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Ministerial Musings

Easter – What happened? Why does it matter?

Do you remember Christmas – how we celebrated the birth of the baby Jesus in a stable in Bethlehem? The Easter story is the final part of that story, showing how Jesus triumphed over everything evil – even death.

On the Sunday before Easter we celebrate the time when Jesus rode into Jerusalem on a donkey and everyone cheered and threw palm leaves on the ground in front of him to make a green road into the city. It was a big procession, full of joy and laughter.

Soon the atmosphere changed as the authorities felt threatened by Jesus and his teaching. On the Thursday before Easter we remember the time when Jesus ate his last supper with his friends. We call it Maundy Thursday (Maundy comes from a word meaning 'I command') because Jesus instructed his followers to 'do this in memory of me'. They were instructed to share in bread and wine, which we do when we have communion services at church. He also instructed them to serve, in the same way that he came as a servant, not as a king. At the last supper Jesus undertook the task of a servant by washing his friends' dusty feet.

Good Friday might seem to be anything but good. It was the day when Jesus was killed as a criminal, even though he had done no wrong. He knew that this would happen, but it didn't make it any easier to bear a horrible death on a cross. It was the darkest of days, but it was the day when good overcame evil.

Of course the story didn't end there. Former Archbishop Michael Ramsey stated simply 'Without the empty tomb there would be no Christianity'. If Jesus did not rise from the dead, our faith is meaningless. But he did! We have historical evidence and the evidence that comes from current personal experience. It is a glorious triumph!

Amongst the chocolate eggs and Easter bunnies take time to remember the Easter story. It's the greatest story ever told, and the most solid hope for the future.

Worship in the Chet Valley

You are welcome to join us at any of our services.

Holy Communion is celebrated every Sunday at one or other of the Chet Valley Churches, either Book of Common Prayer or Common Worship, with an informal Holy Communion service once a month in Chedgrave.



Services of **Morning Worship** are held in Loddon and Hardley.

Families are welcome at all of our services but are particularly catered for on the 1^{st} and 3^{rd} Sunday of the month in Chedgrave.



Creating Connections | Building Communities

Most people experience **loneliness** at some time in their lives, perhaps caused by changes in family circumstances, moving home, bereavement, caring commitments or physical or mental ill health. It affects people of all ages from all backgrounds. While we know that connecting with other people, volunteering or taking part in activities and groups can help overcome a sense of loneliness, it can be hard to take those first steps.

Better Together is here to help with a friendly team of **Life Connectors.**

Life Connectors can visit you in your home and work with you to identify what your interests are, what sort of activities you might enjoy and what is preventing you taking part. Transport or mobility issues? Lack of money? Or you may have caring responsibilities, health issues or lack confidence to join a new group. Life Connectors offer information, advice and support to help you overcome these barriers and connect you to groups, activities and volunteering opportunities in your area.

The service also has a team of **Community Development Workers** including Ben Gulliver whose patch covers much of the South Norfolk area including Loddon & Chedgrave. Ben can offer guidance to anyone who wants to set up a new activity or event, or wants advice about growing an existing group. He can help people apply for Better Together grants of up to £200 and signpost them to funding for larger sums. 'Community activities bring people together, helping us feel more positive about the place we live and the people around us.'

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Xpressions Café needs you



Dry – please ensure the bin lid remains shut.




Easter Traditions from around the world: /taly

The business was our AGM. In almost record time the passing of another successful year was reported including 11 meetings and the trip to Wingfield. Also a succession of displays in Youngs window and the Library. The group finances are in a healthy state, thanks to our Treasurer. A new overhead projector has been purchased using a grant from our new District Councillor, Jeremy Rowe. This is a very welcome addition to our equipment as our old one is about 25 years old and becoming temperamental. The old committee stood down and were re-nominated and voted in with thanks for their hard work from the meeting. These were put together for the Photographic Club Exhibition in the autumn. Jonathan Orland has generously shared his presentation with the History Group so that we can bring it to a wider audience. The pictures were fascinating as were the comments of some of the photographers, who had risked standing in ponds or the marina at the Staithe to take their now photographs.

The meeting concluded with refreshments while the Then and Now images continued to entertain us.





Universal Credit is a monthly payment to help with your living costs. You may be able to get it if you're on a low income or out of work.

Universal Credit will replace the following benefits:

- Child Tax Credit
- Housing Benefit
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA)
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA)
- Working Tax Credit.

If you currently receive any of these benefits, you cannot claim Universal Credit at the same time. You don't need to do anything until you hear from the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) about moving to Universal Credit, unless you have a change in circumstances and need to apply for another benefit.

Here are a few examples of what could trigger the change to Universal Credit (these are not exhaustive):

- Changing from Income Support to Job Seekers Allowance
- Starting work and applying for Working Tax Credits
- Moving to a new area and applying for Housing Benefit with a new Local Authority.

South Norfolk Council have a Benefits Calculator on their website—you can use this to see if you are eligible to claim Universal Credit, and if you might be better off:

Applications for Universal Credit must be made online at

If you and your partner live together, you must apply together as a couple. You need to have a bank account to apply. After you apply, you must contact your local Job Centre within 7 days to make an appointment; you won't get Universal Credit if you don't attend the appointment.



Read Any Good Books Lately?

"Bookworm," by Lucy Mangan

Something a little different to begin with this month: a non-fiction subject, but not a biography nor an autobiography, rather a book that can best be called a memoir. If from a young age you have always enjoyed reading, there couldn't be a better book with which to enjoy some literary nostalgia! The author writes regularly for several national publications as well as being a novelist, but this particular book is all about the wonderful world of books for children of all ages, in today's times and in the past century, from the youngest age possible up to and including the later teenage years. It is not a dull book to read; Lucy Mangan is blessed with a real sense of humour and her writing is witty and full of her opinions (which you do not necessarily have to agree with, of course. We all have our favourites and we don't always share the same ones. Book discussions could become rather boring if that were not the case, couldn't they?). She also gives us glimpses into her family's home life, which are mostly full of affectionate humour and which make entertaining reading in themselves.

(You may be interested to know that Lucy Mangan has also written the following: My Family and Other Disasters, The Reluctant Bride, Hopscotch & Handbags and Inside Charlie's Chocolate Factory. As well as a husband, a small child, and two cats, she has a library of 10,000 books. She herself says that she needs to move...)

"Thomas Cromwell; the Untold Story of Henry VIII's Most Faithful Servant," by Tracy Borman

The author of this biography has done extensive research into Thomas Cromwell's life. At no point does she whitewash her subject, but paints a "warts and all" picture of him. He was a devoted family man, a loyal friend, and obedient in his service to Henry VIII. These virtues were offset by a love of money and an absolute ruthlessness in his political scheming on behalf of his King. Cromwell's rise from being a poor young son of a blacksmith in London, to becoming the most powerful man in England (after the King, of course) was truly astonishing. He epitomises the saying, "the higher you go, the further you have to fall." The last letter he wrote to King Henry before his shockingly botched execution ended with the words, "Most gracious Prince, I cry for mercy, mercy, mercy," but that so-called 'gracious' Prince showed no compassion and none of the loyalty which had been given to him by Cromwell; he ignored the letter completely and, on the very day

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Thomas Cromwell was beheaded Henry VIII celebrated his marriage to his fifth wife, Katherine Howard. There are several books written about Thomas Cromwell, but this one is particularly well written and shows no preconceived bias one way or the other. It is well worth reading.

"Inspector Singh Investigates: A Deadly Cambodian Spree," by Shamini Flint

The "deadly Cambodian spree" forms the basis of a gentle sort of detective story in the Inspector Singh series. There is much humour amongst a lot of sadness, and some really good characters appear - good, in the sense of being vividly drawn, not necessarily in the sense of virtue. Being set in Cambodia, the story cannot help but bring to the reader a salutary reminder of the terrible suffering of the Cambodian people at the hands of the Khumer Rouge and the bombings of the Americans. Don't let this put you off reading, though! It really is a delightful book.

Nature Notes

By the time you read this piece, Winter should be behind us, and some of the familiar Summer bird migrants will have arrived. I remember as a small child going out for walks with my parents looking for signs of Spring, already primroses are in full bloom and the "lamb tails" catkins on Hazel trees are out as is the woolly "pussy willow".

In our last Natures Notes written at the beginning of February we had already heard several of our common birds in full song. As February progressed this increased as more birds started singing including, Greenfinch and Yellowhammer along with the drumming of a Greater Spotted Woodpecker I can hear most mornings. Interestingly I have seen Yellowhammers on the Loddon side of the A146 twice, but they are plentiful son the Sisland side.

While looking out of the window while typing this (2nd March) there is a female Blackbird gathering nest material. Hopefully she won't be building her nest on top of the sloping roof of our Sparrow nest box. One did a few years back and her first and second attempt when completed, slid off. Strangely she never reused any of the material, she was successful with her third attempt as I had screwed a piece of wood to stop the nest slipping off, and she successfully reared a brood.

My yearly bird count has increased to 146, two of which as yet I have only heard. The sharp angry sounding song of the sulking Cettis Warbler at Hardley Flood and a Lesser Spotted Woodpecker at Santon Downham. I did however catchup with a Shorelark on the North end of Kessingland beach after my 4th attempt to find it. At least the dogs enjoyed their walks there


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and the freedom to run around. This morning (3rd March) I took them to Covehythe Broad and managed to locate a solitary Tundra Bean Goose among the Grey Lag Geese there. I must admit I was surprised by the amount of erosion that has happened in the last month as the lower part of the footpath no longer exists.

Other recent highlights, parking at Loddon Staithe and realizing there was a Kingfisher perched giving some fantastic views, firstly of its orange front then its electric blue back. A Grey Wagtail in pristine plumage at Kessingland sewage farm amongst the pied wagtails and pipits. Often good places to bird watch if you can cope with the smell! A distant Great Grey Shrike, fortunately I had my telescope with me. We continue to regularly see a pair of Red Kites round Langley which are always a joy to observe and when walking the dogs at Hardley Staithe I've seen a variety of birds of prey including Red Kites, Common Buzzards, Marsh Harriers, Sparrowhawk, Kestrels and Barn, Short Eared and Little Owls.

While on the subject of birds of prey, a friend and I spent a very pleasant morning parked in a layby in North Norfolk, watching Goshawks, made all the more enjoyable by the lack of wind and the presence of the sun.

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The Suffolk Waste Partnership has recently launched an online directory listing shops, businesses and charities that host refill points for items such as cleaning products, toiletries and dried foods, such as rice or oats and even loose-leaf tea and

Gardening Notes

From the Allotment...

I'm finding it slightly tricky writing these notes some weeks in advance of publication, particularly after a mild winter making things early followed by very changeable and wet weather. You need to vary planting times based on the conditions, so don't plant seeds if it's frosty or waterlogged. So there is no point getting hung up on dates. Wait for the right conditions and the plants will catch up all on their own.

I thought you may find it useful if I pointed you to some websites that give guidance. The first is a simple chart from the RHS at: www.rhs.org.uk/advice/pdfs/vegplanner.pdf and the second starts with general advice, but you can click on a more detailed monthly guide at: www.allotment-garden.org/garden-advice-month.

In my allotment the autumn broad beans are well up and spring broad beans are in and showing. My autumn planted early garlic is well advanced, and even the late harvest variety is appearing. My potatoes are chitted and I'd like to get them in soon, at least the first and second earlies. This will expose the growing tips to the inevitable late frosts so I will protect against this by covering them with straw or fleece when a frost is imminent. I have also been planting potatoes in potato bags in the greenhouse in December, one bag a month, as there is nothing so tasty as a homegrown new potato. I will be planting my onion sets shortly. More on onions next time.

From the garden...

This month we shall all be hoping for a warm and dry late spring, the sweet pea supports will go up this month ready for planting and pots emptied ready for planting summer bedding.

Each year our Garden Club sets a challenge for members which is judged at our annual show in September; this year the challenge is to grow peanuts. We have all been given a couple of fresh peanuts. The instructions are to shell them and plant them in a small pot, water and place in a warm spot until you see signs of growth. The plants will look a bit like sweet peas and they are part of the legume family. After the petals fall off the stalks they somehow bend and grow into the soil to produce more peanuts. The plants will be judged on the number of peanuts produced per pot.

We have grown quite a variety of unusual plants over the years, this will be the second time we have tried peanuts, previous challenges have included aubergine, peppers, avocado, chillies, pelargoniums and coffee, the coffee plants unfortunately were the least successful. Two years ago it was

sundews, which are a carnivorous plant, the germination rate was very good, but it was a challenge to keep them wet using rainwater in a very dry summer. A recent article suggested ditching your plastic bath sponge and growing your own loofah, it is an edible gourd and looks a bit like an ugly cucumber, so maybe next year.
