Holy Communion is celebrated every Sunday at one or other of the Chet Valley Churches, either Book of Common Prayer or Common Worship, with an informal Holy Communion service once a month in Chedgrave.

Soda Bread Small Loaf

300g strong wholemeal bread flour	^{2/3} tbsp treacle
33g rolled oats	^{2/3} tbsp honey
^{2/3} tsp salt	300ml buttermilk
^{2/3} level tsp bicarbonate of soda	^{2/3} tbsp melted butter, to finish

Preheat the oven to fan 175°C [190°C/400°F/gas mark six] and grease a baking sheet.

Put all the dry ingredients in a large mixing bowl and whisk to combine. Make a well in the middle. [*If you choose, you can add other ingredients at this stage: chopped chilli, garlic, toasted pine nuts, whatever takes your fancy.*]

Stir the treacle and honey into the buttermilk until fully mixed, then pour into the well and, very quickly, stir with your hands until you have a soft, sticky dough.

[If you don't have any buttermilk, take 200 ml of milk, preferably full fat, and add 1 tablespoon of lemon juice and set aside for 20 minutes.]

Add to the flour as above. You may need to adjust the amount of liquid or add a bit more flour until the dough is the right consistency.

Form this into a round on your baking sheet and cut a deep cross in the dough. Bake for 40-45 minutes], keeping an eye on it, until the crust is golden and the loaf sounds hollow when tapped underneath. [

Trial and error, depending on your oven. The original recipe said 50-60 minutes. 40 minutes is long enough in mine.

Brush with melted butter and leave to cool before tearing into it. Eat soon, as it doesn't keep well. [*I don't brush it with butter—it's nice but not so healthy*]

Toddler friendly activity ideas for lockdown: - thanks to ex-editor Megan

Baking - simple recipes like fork biscuits, fairy cakes or scones. Cut out fun pastry shapes to make jam tarts.

Indoor picnic, or garden picnic if weather/space allows

Go on a bear hunt on your daily walk, or around your home or garden

Make a den - think clothes airers, blankets/sheets, backs of chairs. Take a torch and a book and have story time inside.

If you have a small tent knocking around your garage or loft, dust it off and put it up in your garden or living room - a ready made den, and exciting to pretend you're going on holiday. You could even pack a bag and make a little snuggly bed area with blankets and pillows

Hide and seek around the house

Treasure hunts around the house or garden - the 'treasure' doesn't need to be fancy, e.g. clothes pegs would do

Obstacle course - can be done inside if you have space. We went over a cushion, under a broomstick, through a 'tunnel' (coffee table with a blanket over two sides) and up onto a chair. Very basic but surprisingly entertaining

Scavenger hunts - make a list of things to find/spot, e.g. something red, a cuddly toy, a book about animals... or make an outdoor themed one for your daily walk or in the garden - a ladybird, a worm, a green leaf, a fluffy cloud

The box game - place some items in a box, without your child seeing. Ask them to put their hands in the box and guess what the items are without peeking. Then swap and let them choose items, while you guess

Set up a library in your house and play borrowing books

Save clean recyclable rubbish e.g. cereal boxes, milk bottles etc for craft- make a rocket, and animal, musical instruments etc - maybe base it around a story your child likes? We made a rocket after reading a Charlie and Lola book where Charlie makes one

Make your own jigsaw by cutting up pictures from magazines/ newspapers

As you may know, we have been trying to bring our concerns about the environment to the fore, not just through our worship and teaching, but also through community involvement, with the Green theme to last year's Spring Fair and linking up with B-lines. Alas, this year it will not be possible to hold the Fair, but our work continues to promote 'green' concerns.

We are trying to reduce our carbon footprint in our energy use and to use renewable resources where possible. You may be aware too that we have been working to make the Churchyard more bee/bird/bat friendly and have planted patches of native flowers in some of the grave surrounds. The newish Bishop of Norwich is an ecologist by training (and a bee-keeper, as you may have seen in the local press) so he is very keen on church involvement in the global need to reverse climate change- at present this has been pushed off the agenda by the Covid-19 emergency, but long after our present crisis is a (vivid) memory, preserving our precious environment will remain the most important challenge facing us all.

The survey, by the way, showed that we are at 'Bronze' level- so we are pleased to have started, but there's plenty of room for improvement!

Loddon and District Local History Group

There will be more news of our meetings when life returns to normal.

However we have, through the hard work of Carol Webb been able to provide a new display in the window of Youngs in Bridge Street. We are grateful for their continued support. This one features some of extensive collection of maps, which live in the Local Studies Room in Loddon Library. When the Library reopens, during staffed hours, these and many others will again be available for inspection. The collection includes OS maps of the area, the 1910 Domesday Maps and the key to owners and occupiers of the property in Loddon and the surrounding parishes in 1910. There will also be available to view when Holy Trinity reopens, Georeferenced versions of the 1840ish Loddon & Chedgrave Tithe Maps will again be on display..

In the library there are also many folders containing information and photographs relevant to the area. This collection was started by Chris Crease & Carol Webb(then Carpenter) in the 1990's. The collection is added to each year as new information, images and reminiscences are provided by friends both local and across the world.

Some of these are indexed, and we had hoped to be working with the Norfolk Record Office to create a catalogue of our whole collection during the coming years. We have been selected as one of a group of Local History Groups to take part in a two year long project on developing our Archive and making it more accessible. Of course this project is now on hold.

Currently parts of our research is accessible in the churchyard. Mini biographies of a few of those buried there are available to see when you exercise in the churchyard, but remember keep away from other walkers. It may be possible to add to these, in the future.

Meanwhile the early Churchwardens Accounts occupy some of my time. They provide a small window into the goings on in the village from the time of Mary & Elizabeth I through to the late 18th century. Maybe next month I can share some "gems" from them.

Nature Notes

Well, who could have imagined the dramatic changes to the world that have unfolded since I wrote April's *nature notes*? My birdwatching excursions have been curtailed, initially to with

in walking distance from our home, and then discovering that I am in the seriously at-risk category, being confined to "barracks" for the foreseeable future.So, all plans are very much on hold. As you read this most summer migrants should have arrived. Swifts should be enticing us with their screaming aerial displays by early May. Swallows, House and Sand Martins will have already arrived, and will be seen displaying over fields, open water and in the case of House Martins around houses. Reed beds will be alive with the songs of Reed and Sedge Warblers, whose songs though similar can be distinguished with practice. The Sedge Warbler's song is like it's on speed, it also tends to sing from a prominent position and will fly up and glide back down to its song perch. Hedgerows will be alive with Common Whitethroat, which has a scratchy song and will also fly up in song and parachute down. Lesser Whitethroat, whose song sounds like the opening phrase of the Yellow Hammers "little bit of bread" though harsher, will sing hidden away then fly some way off to sing again.

Even back in March insects were beginning to wake up. The first butterfly I saw was a Peacock, followed by the beautiful yellow Brimstone and colourful Tortoiseshell. As well as these harbingers of spring, various Bumble Bees were appearing on sunny days. I have even seen a Bee Fly. This interesting looking insect as its names suggests, looks like the offspring of a bee and a house fly. From the 8th of March we were serenaded by a Blackbird from well before daybreak. As morning broke, he was replaced by a Song Thrush and the intermittent drumming of a Greater Spotted Woodpecker, which we can still hear on the 7th of April.

Before having to go into lock down, I did manage to see a Wheatear in a field in Seething which stayed around a couple of days. Probably my best bird was with the dogs out in Thetford Forest, looking once again for the elusive Lesser Spotted Woodpecker. I had already seen some amazing views of Nuthatches plus a pair of Kingfishers on the Little Ouse. Deciding to return to the carpark, I was chatting to a group of foresters having their lunch when one of them said, "are you looking for the Lesser Spotted Woodpecker? I replied the affirmative. "It's sitting on the branch of the tree in front of us" and there it was! What a moment.

Now we are limited to what we can see from the kitchen and bedroom windows where we can observe the busy bird feeders. While digesting the fact I was being quarantined for 12 weeks, we watched an amazing dog fight between two Red Kites and a Buzzard. Then were entertained watching a male Chaffinch deftly removing seeds from Scots pinecones and discarding the papery inedible parts that cascaded downwards. We had the first Brambling of the winter on the feeders, they always seem very nervous watching what everyone else is doing. Then this morning having been enjoying watching a Song Thrush from the kitchen window, I realized the second bird was a Redwing with its prominent eye stripe and orangey patch on its side. The Brambling and Redwing will migrat northwards having overwintered.

Life goes on and we must make what we can of it enjoying what we can see and hear.



Read Any Good Books Lately?

Books can give you escapism, enjoyment and solace at any time. We surely need all these things even more during the present extraordinary time.

"The Distant House," by Kate Morton

Kate Morton can be relied upon to give us a thoroughly enjoyable story. The central character is eminently likeable and the reader can picture all the different characters really clearly. The castle is actually based on Sissinghurst, in Kent, so if anyone has visited Sissinghurst with its beautiful garden you will be able to picture the castle in this novel very clearly. The interplay between the family relations - both the sisters who live in the castle and Edith and her parents - is clever and interesting. The whole story is atmospherically written, and trying to guess what has happened to Tom is an intriguing piece of detective work for any reader to take on! As ever, Kate Morton shows a deep understanding of human feelings of all kinds.

"The Betrayal," by Helen Dunmore

This novel is set in Russia during Stalin's reign of terror. Having survived World War 2 and its aftermath, Andrei and Anna (a doctor and a nursery school teacher respectively) are trying to live as happy and worthwhile a life together as possible - avoiding any rash or contentious actions or speech which might result in their being noticed by the State Security system. A complication arrives, however, in the admission to the hospital where Andrei works, in the form of the young son of one of Russia's most powerful men. The author tells a fascinating story of an appalling time in Russia's history

"Paganini's Ghost," by Paul Adam

A really interesting mystery story this, full of historical and musical information, which is accompanied by several believable and varied individual characters. It's set in Italy and has a plot that definitely makes any reader want to read to the very end.

"The Night Manager," by John Le Carré

It may take a while to adjust to and appreciate Le Carré's style of writing; on several occasions he writes things in list form - lists which can last for whole paragraphs! Once the reader has accepted that, this thriller with its complex plot becomes absorbing. The Night Manager himself is a hotel employee. The hotel is an expensive one in Zurich and is regularly used by very wealthy people, one of whom is Richard Onslow Roper, who is known to some people (including Jonathan Pine, the Night Manager) as "the worst man in the world." Jonathan has connections with the British Secret Service, who wish to bring down Roper, and in helping them to do so he finds himself in extreme danger. He also has a very personal reason for helping to bring about Roper's downfall.

Le Carré's talent for characterisation is brilliant. There are all sorts of different people in this story - young, old; rich, poor; simple to sophisticated; innocent and evil. The tension builds throughout the 473 pages, and you simply have to finish it!

Gardening Notes from seed, it requires careful seedbed preparation, but they keep longer. It's less work and more reliable to grow from 'sets', which are small young onions, but dearer. Feed with concentrated seaweed extract or wood ash once they get going. You often see 'sets' packed in tiny wasteful bags. Loddon Garden and DIY sell them loose.

Secondly, before social distancing, I saw packets of veg seeds flying off the shelves. I think after this crisis people will re-evaluate their personal resilience in many ways, including growing their own food. There are currently vacant allotments in Chedgrave and Loddon. Contact the relevant Parish Clerk for details. I'm sure they will put you on a waiting list.

Finally, an allotment anecdote that will hopefully raise a smile. Twenty-five years ago I had an idea to plant an orchard of old Norfolk apple varieties in Loddon. (I planted another orchard recently and the East of England Apple and Orchards Project still lists 40 Norfolk apples that are available and has many for sale.) To help me choose I spoke to people in Loddon and Chedgrave, including Cecil Nichols and Laurie Sayer. They had the best kept allotments in Loddon and were a fair way to knowing how to grow fruit and veg after a lifetime of practice. The apple they remembered most fondly had the local name Rattlebox. The Beccles and Bungay Journal were interested and sent a reporter one glorious sunny morning. She was young, wearing a very short skirt and high heels, not ideal for allotments. I think Laurie was made nervous, both by being interviewed and by a young lady doing it. He was anxiously running some weeds through his hands all the time she was there. She dutifully ran through her list of questions, but didn't seem to be taking many notes, and as we walked back she asked me to go through the answers again. It turned out every time she looked up from her notebook she had been unable to take her eyes off the **nettles** Laurie was running through his bare hands, oblivious to any stings!

Laurie lived in a house that backed onto the Staithe and the apple tree planted there is in his memory and where his garden once was.

From the Garden.....not quite from the garden as the plants which have caught my eye are in other people's gardens, I've been keeping my (2 metre) distance. On my daily walk after home working I noticed a small rounded bush with a mass of yellow daisy-like flowers, that looked like chrysanthemum but with grey/green foliage. I used an app on my phone called PlantNet to identify it as Euryops Pectinatus. The app also works on wildflowers. The plant is listed by the RHS as a half hardy fast growing shrub up to 1m tall it likes full sun and flowers from June to Autumn, it is still in full flower so the mild winter has been kind, I shall be looking out for one. One plant I have been smelling and not seeing over the last few months is a Daphne, the scent is glorious and travels quite a way on the breeze. I visited a plant friend in February and outside his front door was a large Daphne bush in full flower and scent - the variety was Jacqueline Postill and luckily it had a small rooted cutting !!
