Reading: Matthew 10:24-39

"A disciple is not above the teacher, nor a slave above the master; it is enough for the disciple to be like the teacher, and the slave like the master. If they have called the master of the house Beelzebul, how much more will they malign those of his household!

"So have no fear of them; for nothing is covered up that will not be uncovered, and nothing secret that will not become known. What I say to you in the dark, tell in the light; and what you hear whispered, proclaim from the housetops. Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather fear him who can destroy both soul and body in hell. Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father. And even the hairs of your head are all counted. So do not be afraid; you are of more value than many sparrows.

"Everyone therefore who acknowledges me before others, I also will acknowledge before my Father in heaven; but whoever denies me before others, I also will deny before my Father in heaven.

"Do not think that I have come to bring peace to the earth; I have not come to bring peace, but a sword.

For I have come to set a man against his father, and a daughter against her mother, and a daughter-in-law against her mother-in-law; and one's foes will be members of one's own household.

Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me; and whoever loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me; and whoever does not take up the cross and follow me is not worthy of me. Those who find their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it.

This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Talk [Rev Alison]

I think Jesus must be joking, mustn't he?

All that talk about family strife and swords, that's just not Jesus' way is it. And we know he liked to joke.

There's the story about the camel and the eye of a needle – that would have made them laugh. And the idea of being able to see to take the speck

out of someone's eye when you've got a great big plank in your own. And the notion that a responsible shepherd would leave 99 sheep totally unguarded and go off to find one that had got lost; that just wouldn't happen!

Surely he's joking! Jesus came to bring love:

"Love one another as I have loved you."

And the resurrected Jesus came with peace, greeting his disciples:

Peace be with you!

Just about the last thing he said was a message of comfort:

And remember I am with you always to the end of the age.

And in the passage we've just heard, Jesus reminds us that we are infinitely more valued than the sparrows which God protects.

Love, peace and infinite care. Isn't that what Jesus is all about?

It's perhaps what we want and need in this time of uncertainty, fear, and loneliness.

It's perhaps what we want and need as we move forward.

But actually, I think that Jesus is being deadly serious.

He was constantly in direct opposition to the Jewish authorities both in what he did and what he said. And indirectly, he challenged Roman authority by:

- Speaking out for the poor and the marginalised and the weak;
- Speaking out about justice and forgiveness;
- Speaking out against hypocrisy.

Much as we might like a warm, fuzzy Jesus who makes us feel good about ourselves and comfortable in our lives, that's not really what following Jesus is all about.

If we want to follow Jesus as he invites us to do, we need to be realistic about the cost. After all, a builder won't start without estimating his expenses else he might only build the foundations and run out of money with the laughter of people around him ringing in his ears.

If we want to follow Jesus as he invites us to do, we need to be realistic about the life changes and choices that we make. The rich young man was sad when Jesus told him to sell up and give the money to the poor if he wanted to follow him. We never discover if he did that or was just too wedded to his money that he couldn't change.

Many people have said that lockdown has introduced a pause on the world and as we emerge that we should seek to establish a new normal. In lockdown, we discovered anew the inequalities in our world: those living in cramped living conditions, those living with increased levels of debt, losing their jobs, going days without food – and that's just in our own country, never mind the rest of the planet.

In lockdown, we discovered the damage that has been done to God's creation. I was struck, like many, by the pictures of the Himalayas, visible from India for the first time in 30 years; by the Eiffel Tower and the London Eye not enveloped in a chemical fog; by the resurgence of wildlife. Those in the areas of worst air pollution have been those suffering the greatest death toll from Covid-I9. Animals, including humans, have been forced into greater proximity because of the destruction of habitats which has increased the likelihood of diseases jumping species.

But, in lockdown, we have also discovered our common humanity. People have moved away from individualism to supporting those around them. Keyworkers have held communities together.

We have found that what we have and what we produce are not the most important things – that life itself has a greater value. Dignity for all is a priority where the homeless are housed and our time and our resources are put towards supporting the most vulnerable.

And we have discovered a greater imagination. New hospitals have been built in days; unprecedented levels of government support have come forth; there has been change across the world overnight.

As we emerge from lockdown, this new normal shouldn't just be the old normal or worse a few months down the line; we do not need racism, division, rising levels of inequality and public money used to bail out the worst polluters.

Many charities and church organisations are calling for us to reboot the economy with an emphasis on action to reverse the climate emergency and protection of the most vulnerable high on the agenda.

A new normal—we need to speak out about what this might be and how it might be achieved. How does that make you feel, I wonder? Does it make you feel uncomfortable? Is it a scary proposition? Yes! I think it is.

Jesus says that when we need to speak out, the Holy Spirit will speak in our hearts giving us both the words to say and the confidence to say them. He says that we should have no fear of those who label us and put us down, those who laugh at us. That we should not fear even death; that's perhaps not so likely in the UK but is certainly not unknown around the world.

In his Easter sermon the Archbishop of Canterbury said that, "As people of God we can be a part of casting a vision for a way forward." He asked if we would play our part.

It is an invitation to follow Jesus, and specifically, as the charity Tearfund puts it, to follow Jesus where the need is greatest.

Will you play your part?
