Bible Reading

Romans 6 verses 12-23

¹² Therefore do not let sin reign in your mortal body so that you obey its evil desires. ¹³ Do not offer any part of yourself to sin as an instrument of wickedness, but rather offer yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life; and offer every part of yourself to him as an instrument of righteousness. ¹⁴ For sin shall no longer be your master, because you are not under the law, but under grace.

¹⁵ What then? Shall we sin because we are not under the law but under grace? By no means! ¹⁶ Don't you know that when you offer yourselves to someone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one you obey—whether you are slaves to sin, which leads to death, or to obedience, which leads to righteousness? ¹⁷ But thanks be to God that, though you used to be slaves to sin, you have come to obey from your heart the pattern of teaching that has now claimed your allegiance. ¹⁸ You have been set free from sin and have become slaves to righteousness.

¹⁹ I am using an example from everyday life because of your human limitations. Just as you used to offer yourselves as slaves to impurity and to ever-increasing wickedness, so now offer yourselves as slaves to righteousness leading to holiness.
²⁰ When you were slaves to sin, you were free from the control of righteousness. ²¹ What benefit did you reap at that time from the things you are now ashamed of? Those things result in death! ²² But now that you have been set free from sin and have become slaves of God, the benefit you reap leads to holiness, and the result is eternal life. ²³ For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in^[a] Christ Jesus our Lord.

Talk

Belinda Barwick has written this reflection.

There has been a lot of thinking about slavery – at least for me – in the past few months, with the Black Lives Matter campaign and some of the Black History programmes that have been on television. It is no exaggeration to say that the evils of slavery and its repercussions are still affecting us today. I remember being taught at school about the abolition of slavery (1807 for the trade, total abolition throughout the British Empire not until 1833), with people like Wilberforce behind it, and feeling relieved that the good old Brits were the ones that led such an important campaign. What did not emerge at the time (and this may have been said, but I didn't receive it) was that the good old Brits had also been behind the worst excesses of the slave trade and amassed great fortunes through it. A powerful lobby whose prosperity depended on the slaves in their sugar plantations resisted abolition tooth and nail, there were all sorts of loop holes (slaves were still allowed in Ceylon, for example) and brace yourself – every C of E bishop voted against it when the bill reached the House of Lords.

To be fair to those with an early nineteenth century mindset, slavery had been a part of the way the world worked, forever. They had, quite literally, not seen the error of their ways: perhaps the fact that the fight against slavery was led by one branch of the Church might have led to resistance by the other branch or maybe the fact that they were younger sons of gentry families and an awful lot of the landed gentry had profited by slavery was also a factor. It's sin, though, isn't it? The Church is as capable of sin as its individual members, as the sex abuse scandal cases have shown in recent years. Paul knew all about slaves and in his letter to the Romans he was not putting up an argument against slavery: it was a part of life at that time. When he used the example of being a slave to sin, he was accepting that everyone would know what it was about and what it would entail. To be a slave is to be owned by someone else, to be controlled by them and dependent on them, to have no rights and with any privileges at the disposal of the owner. It means that there isn't much point in having separate thoughts, because you will be told what to think. It means that where you go and what you do is at the whim of someone else. It is dehumanising.

For Christian being a slave to sin is giving the power in our lives to something or someone other than God. It means being ruled by temptations rather than what we know to be right and it means following the worst of our impulses. Those can be impulses to be hard on ourselves and to judge ourselves harshly as well as the impulses to give in to what are more obvious temptations. Rather than listening to the voice of God through our reading of scripture or through prayer we can become locked into a default position or mindset in which we just do not recognise what is God's will and what he is prompting us to do. Sometimes it means perverting God's will, claiming it for our own when actually it is our prejudices or our own desires that have really been behind an action.

Those things are not always easy to see, either. They become established as the way we always do things, with a particular reaction to a person or a decision which may have been good at one time, but now is just what we do, without thinking and certainly without consulting God. The sort of behaviours that can really lead us up the wrong path. The consequences can be difficult to manage, especially if we still don't see what we are doing. I have just started my annual battle with bindweed. It starts in the same way every year – I look around the borders in early June and congratulate myself on all my hard work in getting them under control, with just enough wildness to please the hedgehogs. I have a week or two of sitting on my laurels – or at least on a garden chair – and then I put on my glasses and realise that the attractive range of greens is becoming dominated (strangled) by the dreaded bindweed. If only I had seen that before, I wouldn't be unwinding those horribly complex strands from flower stems. I wouldn't be seeing those large white trumpets opening up in the middle of the hedge. **Why** didn't I see that before? The answer is, of course, because I am far from being a perfect gardener. I am not the Alan Grey of Chedgrave.

It is true of our Christian lives too. Why didn't I see that I was being dominated by one of my besetting sins? Why did I allow myself to drift in such a ridiculous direction? Why didn't I speak out when I should have done? Why am I not more like (fill in the blank with your own standard of perfection). The answer is that quite simply we have not arrived yet. Nor, of course, has, but we can't see that. We're all on the way, getting through life with all its challenges and temptations, its upsides (glorious weather) and its downsides (Covid 19) and all the time God is with us, holding out a hand to comfort, to set us right again, to guide and (sometimes) to admonish.

That is the good news. We are no longer locked in a downwards spiral that will lead us to worse and worse decisions and actions. We have God's help to put on the brakes or even do a handbrake turn and change completely. We are no longer slaves to sin. We are a freed people, because, as Paul told the Romans, God gives freely and his gift is eternal life in union with Christ Jesus. "And when this happens, and when we allow freedom ring, when we let it ring from every village and every hamlet, from every state and every city, we will be able to speed up that day when all of God's children, black men and white men, Jews and Gentiles, Protestants and Catholics, will be able to join hands and sing in the words of the old Negro spiritual:

Free at last! Free at last!

Thank God Almighty, we are free at last!"
