We are going to be using the psalms set for today as our scripture for worship. One of these has a repeated refrain:

Talk [Rev Alison]

The theme of our service today is oil.

Did you hear something about oil in the reading?

How very good and pleasant it is when kindred live together in unity! It is like the precious oil on the head, running down upon the beard, on the beard of Aaron, running down over the collar of his robes.

I wonder if anyone has ever poured oil over your head?!

So much oil that it runs down your face, your beard if you have one, and even over your clothes. Eugh!

Doesn't sound very pleasant does it?

But in the old days, pouring oil on someone, anointing them, was something very special. Something which was holy. Something which said that this person has a special job to do for God—maybe it was being a priest, maybe a king.

Anointing is still important. When our queen, Queen Elizabeth II was crowned, she was anointed with oil to show that she had a special job to do; not oil poured over her but a small amount put on her head. When priests are ordained they have their hands anointed with oil to show that they have a special job to do; I still remember the smell of frankincense from the oil with which my hands were anointed.

In Jesus' time, putting oil on someone's head when they came to your house was a sign of hospitality to them, though I am not sure how much they used, or whether it did indeed run down their beards.

How very good and pleasant it is when kindred live together in unity! It is like the precious oil on the head, running down upon the beard, on the beard of Aaron, running down over the collar of his robes.

The happy co-existence of people is likened to the action of precious oil. It is good and pleasant when kindred live together in unity. And we know that that is true, don't we? When families are in harmony—loving, caring and nurturing each other—it is a good and pleasant thing. When people work well together and co-operate, helping each other out when needed, as we've seen during lockdown, it is a good and pleasant thing. When those who are rich share with those who have little, in order that all may flourish, it is a good and pleasant thing.

Unity is so obviously a good and pleasant thing that you might wonder why we don't achieve it more often; why family members are at odds with one another; why communities break down; why countries are at war.

Why are we so rarely a people living together in unity?

What it is that makes us rub each other up the wrong way, causing friction between us?

What is the grit that stops the moving parts of our relationships from flowing freely?

Making bad choices, thinking that we are better than other people, being selfish and greedy, are some of the more obvious things that spring to mind.

But life's not meant to be like this, is it? What can be done to make things better?

Where can we find a model of how to do it well?

I don't think we have to look too far!

The best example we have of being together in unity is God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit; three parts united into one, each part in unity with the other.

But we are not God, though we are made in God's image, so where does that leave us?

Is this model totally out of reach; impossible to attain?

I think that Jesus knew how difficult it is for us to live together in unity because he prayed about it on the night before his crucifixion:

"I ask not only on behalf of these, but also on behalf of those who will believe in me through their word, that they may all be one. As you, Father, are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me. (John 17:20-21)

Jesus wants us to have the kind of relationship with each other and with him that is in God the Holy Trinity. A continual outpouring and overflowing of love that is evident to all in the world.

He tells his disciples that he will send the Holy Spirit to be with them, to be their guide. It is the Holy Spirit who will help them to follow the example of Jesus' love, of God's love for everyone. Just as it was for his disciples then; it is for all people, at all times.

If we open our hearts and minds to the Holy Spirit, accept the Holy Spirit in our lives, then it is the Holy Spirit who will help us live together harmoniously, guiding our choices, reminding us not to get above ourselves, helping us to move away from being selfish and greedy.

Perhaps we could liken the Holy Spirit to oil making things work smoothly, removing the grit and dirt from our everyday lives, providing lubrication to prevent damage.

It made me think of the Tin Man in the Wizard of Oz. He had seized up in the rain and badly needed to be oiled. The relief he feels when Dorothy and the scarecrow oil his mouth and then arms and his elbows... The oil freed up his joints and allowed him to move smoothly once again. We need the Holy Spirit to free us up. We need the Holy Spirit, God dwelling in us, so that we can become one with God, guided and encouraged to live out our lives in response to God's love and to make new disciples.

But being a Christian is not just about our individual endeavour, it is something that we do in community: spending time with God and spending time with each other.

Together we are to agree and live in peace with one another.

Together we are to live in grace and love and fellowship wherever we find ourselves; in our families, in our work, in our church councils.

Together we are to pray for these things, grace, love and fellowship, to abound for the common good worldwide.

Here's a story from that fractured country, Lebanon; a country that has had more than its fair share of division and conflict. I am sure we've all heard about the terrible explosion in the port in Beirut causing such devastation and destruction; not a bomb this time just gross negligence in a country riddled by government incompetence and corruption. Well, lots of people came to help clear up. One group particularly caught my attention. All women, they are members of the Tripoli cleaning squad just up the coast from Beirut. Here's what they had to say when they arrived to help:

"We remain united no matter how much they try to separate us. Muslim, Sunni, Shia, Druze, Christian... we're all one band."

Isn't that fantastic?

Pause
