Gospel: Matthew 16:13-20

Now when Jesus came into the district of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, 'Who do people say that the Son of Man is?' And they said, 'Some say John the Baptist, but others Elijah, and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' He said to them, 'But who do you say that I am?' Simon Peter answered, 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.'

And Jesus answered him, 'Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven.' Then he sternly ordered the disciples not to tell anyone that he was the Messiah.

Exploring the Word [Rev David]

The way that the pattern of readings works that the church here follows means that the same group of readings crop up every three years. In that time it's fascinating to wonder what might have changed in our lives and what thoughts we may have long forgotten. Some talks or sermons remain with us, others we all have to admit float away. I thought that I'd look to see if I could find my notes from three and six years ago. I could, but they were of no immediate help since six years ago when these readings were to be used I'd talked instead about St Bartholomew—his feast day being 24th August—and then three years ago I may well have been on holiday since my notes go from the week before to the week after! Ah well.

The passage from Matthew's gospel is pivotal. One lesson I do recall with great clarity goes back to my teenage years. When I was in the Lower Sixth form at school doing my science-based A levels I also studied three other O level subjects. One was the ubiquitous General Studies, the second was Welsh—as foreign language—well I was living across the border in England so perfectly entitled to do it that way; and the third was Religious Studies. Clearly a glutton for punishment! I have to confess that much of what I was taught in that year in RS disappeared quite quickly but one point, in particular, stuck. That Jesus's question to the disciples and their response is a pivotal point in both Matthew's and Mark's account of his ministry.

So what of it?

I suppose there are several aspects to it...

When does it occur?

What does it ask?

What is the consequence?

When does it occur? If you care to look back at Matthew's gospel and reread the previous chapter you'll read of Jesus's encounter with the Canaanite woman and the banter they indulge in which results in Jesus acknowledging that his mission is wider than just to the people of Israel. I have often tried to grasp—probably because I endeavour to have a mathematical attitude to it—how Jesus could be 100% human as well as 100% divine. There in that encounter I believe we get a glimpse of his dual nature. A realisation that the human instinct and understanding is transcended by the divine realisation that the purpose of God is greater than first perceived. He has also reminded them to beware of the teachings of the Pharisees and Sadducees. Now he has taken them to the far north two day's journey from the sea of Galilee and poses the question...

"Who do people say that the Son of Man is?"

The disciples' reply tells us a great deal about how Jesus was seen by the people. Not a gentle strolling teacher but one of the prophets—those fireblazing ones, such as Elijah or Jeremiah, or John the Baptist.

Then he asks them, "But who do you say that I am?" Notice the link: 'Son of Man' and 'I'; yes, he links the two. Many know Simon Peter's reply: "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God." You're the One we've been waiting for, you're the One whom those prophets the people perceive you to be, foretold. The disciples had moved from thinking of Jesus as God's mouthpiece, to believing that he was the Messiah. That was dangerous, since that put him in a place of challenge not just to the Temple authorities but to the wider authorities. The disciples, as Tom Wright says in his commentary on this passage, are now moving up a notch from signing up to a prophetic movement to a royal challenge. One which would require courage and a sure foundation—Simon gets a new understanding of his name Peter: "...on this rock I will build my church."

So, what is the consequence? Having made that declaration, having recognised that this Jesus is the Messiah, there's a journey to be made.

Peter wasn't perfect. Later in the story this same Peter was more like crumbling sand than a secure rock when he denied that he even knew who Jesus was, let alone that he was a follower. But once that acknowledgement has been made, if we are able to do so then we are encouraged to walk the journey with Jesus. I'm currently reading a novel, it's a light read, in which there is a thread of perseverance, a desire by the main character to see the affair that begins quite casually but becomes more and more complex, through to its conclusion.

Knowing that the Son of Man is indeed the Son of God who can sustain us through the trials of life. We too might begin our dalliance with faith in a casual manner but as we progress, the journey becomes more complex and deeper. But that is also the joy of faith and the security to help us through the challenges that the world throws at us.

Affirmation of Faith
