The Liturgy of the Word

The First Reading: 1 Timothy 6:11-19

But as for you, man of God, shun all this; pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance, gentleness. Fight the good fight of the faith; take hold of the eternal life, to which you were called and for which you made the good confession in the presence of many witnesses. In the presence of God, who gives life to all things, and of Christ Jesus, who in his testimony before Pontius Pilate made the good confession, I charge you to keep the commandment without spot or blame until the manifestation of our Lord Jesus Christ, which he will bring about at the right time—he who is the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords. It is he alone who has immortality and dwells in unapproachable light, whom no one has ever seen or can see; to him be honour and eternal dominion. Amen.

As for those who in the present age are rich, command them not to be haughty, or to set their hopes on the uncertainty of riches, but rather on God who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment. They are to do good, to be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share, thus storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of the life that really is life.

My Jesus, My Saviour, Lord there is none like you. All of my days, I want to praise the wonders of Your mighty love.

My comfort, my shelter, tower of refuge and strength. Let every breath, all that I am, never cease to worship You.

Shout to the Lord, all the earth, let us sing, Power and majesty, praise to the King!

Mountains bow down and the seas will roar, At the sound of your name! I sing for joy at the work of your hands, Forever I'll love you, forever I'll stand. Nothing compares to the promise I have in You.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 6:19-33

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Matthew. **Glory to you, O Lord.**

Jesus said, 'Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

The eye is the lamp of the body. So, if your eye is healthy, your whole body will be full of light; but if your eye is unhealthy, your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light in you is darkness, how great is the darkness! No one can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth. Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?

And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life? And why do you worry about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which is alive today and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you—you of little faith? Therefore do not worry, saying, "What will we eat?" or "What will we drink?" or "What will we wear?" For it is the Gentiles who strive for all these things; and indeed your heavenly Father knows that you need all these things. But strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, O Christ.

Talk [Rev David]

Is your glass half full or is the glass half empty? I once asked that question to a group of people only to be challenged by the retort.... from an engineer - who replied that there's another category - Has the glass been made twice as big as it should be. Well of course that might be the case. But I'm sure we know many people who see the glass half empty and they will also be the ones who, at the slightest provocation, will become worried.

Worry seems to be a human condition which is inbuilt into a significant number of people. Now of course it is right to get worried about some things that threaten us or we encounter but there are other situations when the worrying attitude of one will permeate through a crowd and all of a sudden there is a mass panic. Worry just exacerbates into panic.

So how do we stop worrying? In the Gospel reading for today from Matthew chapter 6 we get some forthright - and basic - teaching. Bishop Tom Wright somewhere poses the question: "Has it ever struck you what a basically happy person Jesus was?" We might be aware of all the trials and tribulations he endured but his experience of the natural world which he saw around him taught him what a wonderful place it was. The flowers of the field, the birds of the air the grass on the hillside, all this beauty, required one to live in the present. To enjoy the moment. Okay that seems fanciful when one is struggling to pay the bills, struggling to feed the family, struggling to see those whom we love but it is at these times more than others that we need to hold on to the promises of Jesus and to recognise the generosity of God. Jesus in this passage doesn't mean that these things don't matter. Rather he's encouraging his followers to get their priorities sorted. If the world comes first, with its cares and concerns, then there's every chance that it will get all moth-eaten and rusty; put God first then there's every chance that you'll get the world as well.

Living without worry sounds impossible. Those hooked on it, if they haven't got anything to worry about find themselves worrying that they have forgotten something! But recognising that the God, the Father whom Jesus talks of, is generous - someone who wants to give good things to us requires us to learn how to receive and to do so with joy, with open arms and empty hands. As St Paul, writing to the young church leader Timothy, says: "Set your hope on God... who provides us with everything, for our enjoyment." (*I Timothy 6:17*).

Rowan Williams in his book "Holy Living", reminds us right at the outset of that book that "[The] Christian life, ... is not a matter of calculation or realism. Risk is incalculable, grace is incalculable, Christ is incalculable. He (Christ) calls us to attend to and respond to his Word.... and there meet the absolute gratuity and unexpectedness of his measureless compassion." All of which is offered because we have a generous God.

The Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead,

and the life of the world to come. Amen.

For generosity in love, encouragement and hope, for openness in invitation and hospitality, for wisdom in the gift of friendship.

We offer ourselves to you, O God.

For serving you as you deserve, for following our calling as your disciples, for serving you with gladness of heart.

We offer ourselves to you, O God.

For being a blessing through the blessings we receive, for generosity which enables mission, for sharing abundantly in every good work.

We offer ourselves to you, O God.

For living a generous life, for our actions to point beyond themselves, for our generosity to be an expression of love and gratitude.

We offer ourselves to you, O God.

When supper was ended he took the cup of wine. Again he praised you, gave it to them and said: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross. Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

Praise to you, Lord Jesus:

Dying you destroyed our death, rising you restored our life: Lord Jesus, come in glory.

Lord of all life, help us to work together for that day when your kingdom comes and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth. Look with favour on your people, gather us in your loving arms and bring us with all the saints to feast at your table in heaven. Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father, for ever and ever. **Amen**.


Offering ourselves into the hands of God, as our Saviour taught us, so we pray
