

The Greeting

The Liturgy of the Word

Epistle: I John 1:1-10

We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life—this life was revealed, and we have seen it and testify to it, and declare to you the eternal life that was with the Father and was revealed to us—we declare to you what we have seen and heard so that you also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ. We are writing these things so that our joy may be complete.

This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light and in him there is no darkness at all. If we say that we have fellowship with him while we are walking in darkness, we lie and do not do what is true; but if we walk in the light as he himself is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin. If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us.

For the Word of the Lord, Thanks be to God.

Alleluia, alleluia. The Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory. **Alleluia**.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

Glory to you O Lord.

Jesus said to Peter, 'Follow me.' Peter turned and saw the disciple whom Jesus loved following them; he was the one who had reclined next to Jesus



at the supper and had said, 'Lord, who is it that is going to betray you?' When Peter saw him, he said to Jesus, 'Lord, what about him?' Jesus said to him, 'If it is my will that he remain until I come, what is that to you? Follow me!' So the rumour spread in the community that this disciple would not die. Yet Jesus did not say to him that he would not die, but, 'If it is my will that he remain until I come, what is that to you?'

This is the disciple who is testifying to these things and has written them, and we know that his testimony is true. But there are also many other things that Jesus did; if every one of them were written down, I suppose that the world itself could not contain the books that would be written.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, O Christ.

Talk [Rev David]

So Christmas is over. For many the tinsel and trees, the tidying-up after Christmas Day has happened although with tomorrow being a Bank Holiday in lieu of yesterday perhaps not quite yet. But Christmas has only just begun—the season of Advent ceased on Christmas Eve and the Christmas season began on Christmas Day and continues until Candlemas. Ok, the trappings and decorations may well come down on 12th Night but the Christmas celebrations should continue until the beginning of February. Christmas isn't over. Neither is the Story.

This year our celebrations may be different to those we have had in the past but even so the hope offered in the One who came as a babe is still the same.

On this the final Sunday of 2020 we might look back at what has occurred and wonder where has God been in all of this. That's the paradox. We often ask where God is when at the same celebrating Christmas, the epitome of God being one with us through the incarnation. I believe that God has been alongside us this year. Yes, there are those who have not survived the virus, there are those whose livelihoods have been shattered, and none of us have been immune to its effect even if what we've suffered might be unfulfilled plans and hopes. Yet here we are two days after Christmas recalling the birth of a babe in Bethlehem. The Word made Flesh.

Whether or not John the apostle and John the evangelist are one and the same the Church honours on this day the one who makes that

proclamation—The Word made Flesh—and who is also 'the disciple whom Jesus loved'. What do we know about him? The Gospel accounts tell us that he was one of the sons of Zebedee, that he and his brother, James, were given the nickname by Jesus in Mark's gospel of Boanerges, meaning 'sons of Thunder' (I do wonder why?). John is an ever present: he is on the mountain of transfiguration, he is at the Last Supper, he is in the Garden of Gethsemane, he is in the temple courtyard and he is at the foot of the Cross. He saw and he shared in Jesus's ministry—but more than this he was also a visitor to the Tomb and in consequence because of what he experienced he proclaimed.

Our two readings today have been taken from one of John's letters and from the Gospel given his name. And in them both he makes a resounding declaration. It starts the letter, in the Gospel it brings it to a climactic conclusion. It is so important that as he starts his letter he says a particular phrase, not once but twice: "what we have heard, what we have seen with our own eyes..." (IJoI.I & 3). This isn't hearsay I'm sharing, John writes, but what I am able to testify because... I was there.

Being somewhere when a momentous international or national or personal event takes place is tremendous. Maybe that is what we have also missed this year. Which makes what we have been able to share all the more precious and given us the determination to do so again.

The apostle John wants—needs—to share his good news because through acknowledging who Jesus is, will ensure that "our joy may be complete". Not just his and those to whom he is writing but to all who are prepared to believe his testimony and act upon it. are we up for that challenge? Perhaps we can start when we take down those Christmas cards by praying for those who sent them or dialling their number to call them. Let's share the Good News of Jesus; who came that we might have life in all its fullness.

Affirmation of Faith

Let us affirm our faith in Jesus Christ the Son of God.

Though he was divine, he did not cling to equality with God, but made himself nothing.

Taking the form of a slave, he was born in human likeness. He humbled himself and was obedient to death, even the death of the cross. Therefore God has raised him on high, and given him a name above every name: that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, and every voice proclaim that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. Amen

In the power of the Spirit and union with Christ let us pray to our Heavenly Father:

Your son shared the life of his home and family at Nazareth. Father, protect in your love our neighbours, our families, and the communities of which we are a part.

Rejoicing in the fellowship with the shepherds, the angels, the magi, the virgin Mary and St Joseph, we commend ourselves and all people to your unfailing love.

Merciful Father, accept these prayers for the sake of your Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying: 'Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.'

Therefore, heavenly Father, we remember his offering of himself made once for all upon the cross; we proclaim his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; we look for the coming of your kingdom, and with this bread and this cup we make the memorial of Christ your Son our Lord.

Praise to you, Lord Jesus:

Dying you destroyed our death, rising you restored our life: Lord Jesus, come in glory. Accept through him, our great high priest, this our sacrifice of thanks and praise, and as we eat and drink these holy gifts in the presence of your divine majesty, renew us by your Spirit, inspire us with your love and unite us in the body of your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Through him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, with all who stand before you in earth and heaven, we worship you, Father almighty, in songs of everlasting praise:

Blessing and honour and glory and power be yours for ever and ever. Amen.
