

Abiding in Christ: the unity of the whole person

A reading from John's Gospel, chapter 15 beginning at verse 1.

I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine-grower. He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you.

Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you.

My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples. As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete.

'This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you. I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father.

You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another.

Short Reflection [Rev David]

The reading we've just heard always brings a lump to my throat. It was the passage on which I preached my first sermon. Thinking back all those years makes me realise how the certainty of youth—I was 17 at the time—can seem precocious to one's elders! Yet as I re-read that passage so much still resonates. There is within it several "unions".

There is the unity of the branch to the root-stock; there is the unity of the vine-dresser to the plant; and there is, in the second half of the reading, the unity of friendship.

All three aspects speak to us today. The purpose of the branch is to bear fruit and the only way that can be done is by receiving the sap from the stem. The rootstock provides the wherewithal for existence and for the

produce. But then Jesus says that beyond the rootstock is the one who cares and tends the plant—God—who manages the dressing of the vine by pruning and nurturing. To be a whole person John writes we need to be attached to Christ and allow ourselves to be nurtured by God.

In our service last week, Reverend Alison reminded us of the importance of listening to God since each and every one of us has a vocation—a calling—if we're prepared to listen to what it is. One aspect of our calling is that to be whole we need to abide in the love that flows from God through Jesus and which we can share with those around us—especially in these times when isolation and separation is so prevalent.

▲Intercessions

God of love, through Christ you said to us: "You did not choose me but I chose you." You invite us to receive your friendship. Teach us to respond more deeply to this invitation, and to grow and grow in a life that is ever more complete.

The visible unity of Christians

A reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, chapter 1 beginning at verse 10.

Now I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you should be in agreement and that there should be no divisions among you, but that you should be united in the same mind and the same purpose. For it has been reported to me by Chloe's people that there are quarrels among you, my brothers and sisters. What I mean is that each of you says, 'I belong to Paul', or 'I belong to Apollos', or 'I belong to Cephas', or 'I belong to Christ.' Has Christ been divided?

Short reflection

As we look back over the history of the church it isn't one to be proud of. And we don't even need to look back since even today there is evidence of so many instances of dis-unity. Much to the church's shame.

Last week I joined in with a prayer vigil around the pandemic and as I was praying and meditating I discovered a little book on my book-shelf, "Prayers that Live" by Frank Colqhoun. I've had for it for many years—long before I came to Norfolk—reading it, I came across a prayer which was added to the Book of Common Prayer in 1715 upon the accession of the House of Hanover to be used on the anniversary of the monarch's accession:

"O God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, our only Saviour the Prince of Peace: give us grace seriously to lay to heart the great

dangers we are in by our unhappy divisions. Take away all hatred and prejudice, and whatsoever else may hinder us from godly union and concord: that, as there is but one body, and one Spirit, and one hope of our calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of us all; so we may henceforth be all of one heart, and of one soul, united in one holy bond of truth and peace, of faith and charity, and may with one mind and one mouth glorify thee; through Jesus Christ our Lord."

There is room for diversity in the church. It is only fair to say that we cannot all agree with one another on every point of doctrine or practice. But however much we disagree we must rid ourselves of amongst other things an exclusive sectarian spirit which hinder us from living to the full the life God wants. Frank Colquhoun quotes from John Wesley's Letter to a Roman Catholic (1749):

"If we cannot as yet think alike in all things, at least we may love alike. Herein we cannot possibly do amiss. For of one point none can doubt a moment: God is love, and he that dwelleth in love, dwelleth in God, and God in him.'

Let us heed and act on that desire.

Intercessions

Holy Spirit, you create and re-create the Church in all places. Come and whisper in our hearts the prayer which Jesus addressed to his Father on the eve of his passion: "that they may all be one... so that the world may believe".

Thank you. Amen.

Lord Jesus, Prince of Peace, light the fire of your love in us so that suspicions and misunderstanding cease in the Church. May the walls that separate us fall.

Thank you. Amen.

Holy Spirit, Consoler of all, open our hearts to forgiveness and reconciliation and bring us back to you when we lose our way.

Thank you. Amen.

Lord Jesus, gentle and humble of heart, give us poverty of spirit so that we may be open to your grace.

Thank you. Amen.

Holy Spirit, you never abandon the men, women and children who are persecuted for their faithfulness to the gospel. Give them strength and courage, and support those who help them.

Thank you. Amen.

Let us offer, in whatever way seems appropriate, a sign of Christ's peace as our prayer and commitment to unity.

The unity of all peoples with all creation

A reading from the Revelation, chapter 7 beginning at verse 9

After this I looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm

branches in their hands. They cried out in a loud voice, saying, 'Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!'

And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshipped God, singing, 'Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honour and power and might be to our God for ever and ever! Amen.'

Short reflection

For some this period of lockdown has provided another opportunity to engage with nature. To re-appraise the space and environment around them. "No man is an island" - wrote John Donne - recognising our need to be in comm-unity, one with another, is of importance, yet their is also a unity required between humanity and nature. The way we "use" the world's resources not only impacts on our lives but also on the very essence of creation. The care we take of creation is not just for us but for generations to come.

I mentioned that I was a teenager when I first preached on John 15. Now, nearly 50 years later, it is often teenagers who are carrying the torch to challenge all of us to respect and care for the world in which we live. To be in union with the environment requires us to be willing to recognise that it isn't ours but God's; and that the Vine-dresser's requirement for us to bear fruit involves the "mundane" aspects of life.

The LORD's sovereignty is paramount. It is through our unity with Jesus and with each other that we can truly live and move and have our being.

God of life, you have created everyone in your image and likeness. We sing your praise for the gift of our many cultures and traditions. Grant us the courage to stand against injustice and prejudice.

God of peace, God of love, in you is our hope!

Merciful God, you have shown us in Christ that we are one in you. Teach us to use this gift in the world so that believers of all faiths in every country may be able to listen to each other and live in peace.

God of peace, God of love, in you is our hope!

O Jesus, you came into the world and shared fully in our humanity. You know the hardships of life for people who suffer in so many different ways. May the Spirit of compassion move us to share our time, gifts and resources with all those in need.

God of peace, God of love, in you is our hope!

Holy Spirit, you hear the fury of your wounded creation and the cries of those already suffering from climate change. Guide us toward new ways of living that are in harmony with all creation.

God of peace, God of love, in you is our hope!

At the centre of the world is God, in whom all our desires and longings find their meeting place. As we move closer to God, so we draw closer to one another. And the closer we come to one another, the closer we come to God.

Let us pray as one the prayer that Jesus taught us as his disciples

Our Father in heaven hallowed be your name your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.
Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.

Love divine, all loves excelling,
Joy of heav'n to earth come down:
Fix in us thy humble dwelling,
All thy faithful mercies crown:
Jesus, thou art all compassion,
Pure, unbounded love thou art;
Visit us with thy salvation,
Enter ev'ry trembling heart.

Come, Almighty to deliver,
Let us all thy life receive;
Suddenly return, and never,
Nevermore thy temples leave.
Thee we would be always blessing,
