□ New Testament Reading: Hebrews 5. 5-10

Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him, 'You are my Son, today I have begotten you'; as he says also in another place, 'You are a priest for ever, according to the order of Melchizedek.'

In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

Gospel Reading: John 12.20-33

The Lord is a great God. O that today you would listen to his voice. Harden not your hearts.

Praise to you O Christ, King of eternal glory.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

Glory to you O Lord.

Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, 'Sir, we wish to see Jesus.' Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, 'The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honour.

'Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say—"Father, save me from this hour"? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name.' Then a voice came from heaven, 'I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again.' The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, 'An angel has spoken to him.' Jesus answered, 'This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. Now is the judgement of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself.' He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you O Christ.

Talk [Rev Ros]

This is the time of year when the gardeners among us start to think about sowing seeds. Indeed, you may have already sown some. Seeds are miracles. Some so tiny that you can hardly see them. Some so big like coconuts that you can hold them in your hands. Within each is the requirement to grow into a specific plant. Tomato seed will grow into tomatoes and not radishes. Each has the potential to grow into a plant but unless the seeds are released from their hermetically sealed package and placed on or into soil or compost and given the right conditions of warmth and water, they won't grow. They have to be buried before new life springs up. Jesus knew this and chose the illustration of the grain of wheat falling into the ground and dying in order to bring life in abundance. "Unless, a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies; it remains just a single grain, but if it dies it bears much fruit".

The trigger for this teaching was a request made by some Greeks to see Jesus. They had come to worship at the Passover. This was not uncommon

because there were non-Jews who were what we might call God fearing. At some point they had seen or heard Jesus, perhaps as he rode into Jerusalem on the first Palm Sunday. As Greeks they would have been allowed to visit the Temple in the court of the Gentiles and may be witnessed Jesus throwing the stall holders, the animals and the money changers out. Perhaps they heard him say that the Temple is a house of prayer for all nations and wanted to talk to him about this. Whatever the reason, they wanted to see Jesus face to face. They don't feel confident enough to seek him out by themselves so they approach Philip. He's not sure about this so he goes to Andrew and you can imagine them saying, "I'm not sure about this. Do you think Jesus wants to see them? Well let's ask him". I don't think they took the Greeks with them. I think they went to ask Jesus and instead of him saying, "Yes, of course", or "No I've too much going on", Jesus says, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified" and then talks about wheat dying in order to bring new life.

It seems that this is a sign that now is the time for the gospel of salvation to go out beyond Jerusalem. Up until now when Jesus has done things that upset the religious leaders they didn't arrest him because his hour had not yet come, but now with the request of the Greeks to see him, he says, "Now is the hour, now is the time."

Time for what? To issue a call to arms? To rise up against the Roman occupation? To establish his kingdom? Well yes, but not in the way they all imagine. Hence Jesus explains with the image of the wheat dying. Because his hour was to go to the cross to be lifted up in order to draw all people to him. The Son of Man was a messianic title. Now is the time to bring glory to himself and to Israel. Not by leading an armed rebellion but by facing the horror of the cross. By dying and rising again he will bring people of every race to himself.

Just before this passage of scripture that we're concentrating on, John writes about the crowd who had witnessed the raising of Lazarus going with Jesus into Jerusalem carrying palms. Crowds from Jerusalem went out to meet him. The Pharisees said to one another, "You see, you can do nothing. The world has gone after him." They don't realize how true this is, because by being lifted up, the whole world has the opportunity to go after him, to follow him.

The crowds round Jesus hear a voice from Heaven, not for Jesus' benefit but for the by standers. Some hear it as thunder. Some might remember

hearing it at his baptism and at the transfiguration affirming that Jesus is the beloved Son who had already been glorified and will be glorified again but by being lifted up on a cross.

This causes consternation among the crowd, as well it might. How can it be that the Son of Man, the Messiah, who will live for ever be lifted up? The crucified Messiah was a stumbling block to most Jews. What they fail to understand is that Jesus, by offering himself, became a high priest, called by God, who in offering himself actually made the sacrificial system redundant. On Good Friday, at the point of his death, the veil, the heavy curtain that separated the Holy of Holies from the rest of the Temple, was torn from top to bottom. The Holy of Holies could be entered only by the High Priest and by him only on one day of the year, the Day of Atonement, after he had offered sacrifices for his own sin. Jesus was sinless and when the veil was torn the way was open to God, there was no more need for sacrifices, although they continued to be offered until the Temple was destroyed by the Romans. For those who came to believe Jesus was the Messiah, what he did by dying and rising again was enough.

When Jesus talked about being lifted up, he probably had in mind the time when the Israelites were bitten by snakes when they were in the wilderness. Moses lifted up a bronze serpent so that those who had been bitten by snakes, simply by looking at it could be healed. Earlier in John's gospel, he records Jesus saying, "And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up that whoever believes in him may have eternal life." A greater one than Moses was offering so much more than healing in this life; by being lifted up and by dying like the wheat seed he was offering life in abundance for eternity.

The Affirmation of Faith

Let us affirm our faith in Jesus Christ the Son of God.

Though he was divine, he did not cling to equality with God, but made himself nothing.

Taking the form of a slave, he was born in human likeness. He humbled himself and was obedient to death, even the death of the cross.

Therefore God has raised him on high, and given him the name above every name: that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow,

and every voice proclaim that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. Amen.

▲ Prayers

We are nearing the end of this year's journey through Lent. This week is Passion Sunday, and in another week we will have the joy of Palm Sunday followed immediately by the solemnity of Holy Week. So, as a focus for our prayers, I'm thinking about endings. Some endings are personal, some corporate, some national or international.
