Gospel Reading: John 20:19-30

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you.' When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained.'

But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, 'We have seen the Lord.' But he said to them, 'Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe.'

A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' Talk [Rev David]

Many years ago now, during the final year at junior school my teacher introduced the class to J R R Tolkien's novel, *The Hobbit*, the task she set each week was for us to write a précis of the chapter we'd had read to us and to draw an illustration to accompany it. I recall vividly that my template for drawing Bilbo Baggins was "Noddy"! Ah well. I also recall the chapter from the book, Riddles in the Dark, in which Bilbo, having found "the Ring" has now encountered Gollum and finds himself in a riddle challenge. Riddles can be fun and clever. "What has roots as nobody sees, Is taller than trees, Up, up it goes, And yet never grows?" [A mountain]. They can also be old and corny like the Christmas Cracker riddle which asks, "When is a door, not a door?" The answer being, "When it is a-jar."

Our gospel reading, on this the second Sunday of Easter, begins by recounting the story of the disciples who are firmly behind a locked door; this is a door which is definitely not ajar.

Doors have two main functions, they exist to keep things in or to keep things out. No matter how ornate or plain they are that is what they're there to do. In John's account of the events of that first Easter evening, the door of the house where the disciples are meeting, is definitely serving the purpose of keeping things out! We are told that it was locked "for fear..." When we are afraid there is a natural instinct to keep things out, to keep things at bay. I'm not surprised that they were fearful, they had discovered that the body of Jesus wasn't in the tomb, they had been told by Mary Magdalene that she had actually had an encounter with Jesus and had "seen the Lord", and they were now trying to make sense of it all. Then, it happened. Jesus came and stood among them. And said: "Peace be with you." Fear, surprise, peace. What an injunction! John tells us that Jesus then showed them his wounds and breathed on them. But there was one disciple, at least, who wasn't there that evening. Where he was the gospel writer doesn't explain suffice to say that he is incredulous about what the others tell so much so that it has led to him forever having the epithet of Doubting Thomas. Not surprisingly he too wants to see the wounds which the others have been privileged to have seen. And he has to wait—a whole week is to pass before Jesus reappears—and yet again the door is shut. Once more there is still an air of uncertainty between those inside and those who are outside. This time Jesus is very personal speaking directly to Thomas he offers him the opportunity to look and touch and Thomas's response is the acclamation: "My Lord and my God".

It is in that moment of recognition of who the risen Jesus is that the task of those first disciples become paramount. Let's not forget what a disparate group of individuals they were—drawn from a variety of backgrounds with little in common yet now given a common purpose.

In the first of the trilogy which makes up *The Lord of the Rings* Tolkien entitled it *The Fellowship of the Ring*. In that too, a disparate group are given a common purpose, but they are charged with being a "fellowship". Something which the theologian Jane Williams picks up from this passage in John's gospel and the other writings attributed to him—the letters of I & 2 John.

The task that Jesus gave to those first disciples is one that he gives to his church today. To create a fellowship, "that is strong through its truthfulness..." Those first disciples, we are reminded, had overplayed their own capabilities "...they had said that they would never abandon Jesus, that they would follow him and stick with him through anything, and they know that their lies led to disintegration of the fellowship at the Cross."

The new fellowship, our fellowship of the Church, must be different. It must be based on the recognition that true fellowship can only be built on an appreciation and recognition that we continually need no longer to be fearful but rather keep the door of our lives ajar to allow for God's forgiveness to enter.
