Gospel Reading: Matthew 20:20-28

Then the mother of the sons of Zebedee came to Jesus with her sons, and kneeling before him, she asked a favour of him. And he said to her, 'What do you want?' She said to him, 'Declare that these two sons of mine will sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your kingdom.' But Jesus answered, 'You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I am about to drink?' They said to him, 'We are able.' He said to them, 'You will indeed drink my cup, but to sit at my right hand and at my left, this is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared by my Father.'

When the ten heard it, they were angry with the two brothers. But Jesus called them to him and said, 'You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones are tyrants over them. It will not be so among you; but whoever wishes to be great among you must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be your slave; just as the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, O Christ.

Sermon [Rev David]

A couple of years ago I took my mother on a nostalgia trip to the Llŷn Peninsula in North Wales. It was where some of her-my-family came from. She hadn't been able to visit there for many a year so it was quite a journey. The thing that astounded me was her memory of where the little roads actually went—where they would reappear if we took them. After a while we came to Aberdaron. Whilst there she reminisced about a journey she'd made from Aberdaron to the island of Bardsey which is about two miles off the coast. More of that in a moment. As she stayed in the car my wife and I went to visit the parish church where previous vicars had been the poet R S Thomas and the liturgist Jim Cotter. As we wandered in I picked up a little guide, on the cover of which was an injunction to saunter. Along with the injunction was the derivation of that word: saunter, from the French "Sante Terre"—holy ground. A reminder that when we saunter we are doing so over holy ground. Most apposite for that part of Llŷn, as Bardsey is often referred to as the island of 20,000 saints. It was the main reason my mother, and my father, made the crossing with a group of others as they went on a pilgrimage to Bardsey.

Today, the 25th July, is the feast day of St James. What do we know about him? I'm sure that many would be able to recall that he was a disciple of lesus; that he was the brother of John; that he was a fisherman on Lake Galilee: that he was the son of Zebedee. But what else do we know of him? We get told in the gospels that both he and John were given the nickname Boarneges by Jesus—it only appears once in the New Testament—meaning Sons of Thunder. We do also know that he, along with John and Peter were privy to some of the most intimate moments in Jesus' ministry. He shares in the raising of Jairus' daughter, he is present at the Transfiguration and in the Garden of Gethsemane. He also has, in today's Gospel reading, a mother who speaks asking that her two sons will sit at the right and left of lesus when He sits in glory. Which leads to that ominous passage which we've just heard of them needing to drink the same cup as Jesus and being baptised with the same suffering. But we are also aware—as the writer of Acts has told us—he does indeed suffer. Of the twelve disciples he, and ludas, are the only two whose death we read about in the New Testament. Herod Agrippa executes James in the hope that by doing so he will put an end to this new-fangled teaching. Little hope indeed.

How he came to be the patron saint of pilgrims one will never really know but suffice to say he did and there's the link with saunter. Since making a pilgrimage, being a pilgrim, turns the soil over which we tread into holy ground. Pilgrimages require us to take our time, to drink in deeply of why we're making the journey and what we need to reflect upon on the way. The destination is important but so is the travelling. We need a goal but we mustn't rush to get there. A pilgrimage isn't in essence a race. Today people will make pilgrimages to places of quiet, of sanctity, of reverence and history. There are many such places in our land without having to go abroad. But a true place of pilgrimage will be a place that will encourage us to get closer to God, to pray and worship to discern through the Spirit what our life paths ought to be. Yes there are grandiose places—Santiago de Compostella, Rome, Jerusalem—but there are also smaller, lesser frequented places where earth and heaven seem to touch and kiss each other. It might be your own back garden—take your time and saunter there.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross. Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.
