Reading: Hebrews 2:5-12

Now God did not subject the coming world, about which we are speaking, to angels. But someone has testified somewhere, "What are human beings that you are mindful of them, or mortals, that you care for them? You have made them for a little while lower than the angels; you have crowned them with glory and honour, subjecting all things under their feet."

Now in subjecting all things to them, God left nothing outside their control. As it is, we do not yet see everything in subjection to them, but we do see Jesus, who for a little while was made lower than the angels, now crowned with glory and honour because of the suffering of death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone.

It was fitting that God, for whom and through whom all things exist, in bringing many children to glory, should make the pioneer of their salvation perfect through sufferings. For the one who sanctifies and those who are sanctified all have one Father. For this reason Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters, saying, "I will proclaim your name to my brothers and sisters, in the midst of the congregation I will praise you."

This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

It's all about control today. It started, as far as the Bible is concerned, right at the beginning. In the very first chapter of the Bible we hear: (Gen 1:26-28)

And God said, Let us make man in our image, after our likeness: and let them have **dominion** over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the earth, and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth. So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he them; male and female created he them. And God blessed them, and God said unto them, Be fruitful, and multiply, and replenish the earth, and **subdue** it: and have **dominion** over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over every living thing that moves upon the earth.

We find the same theme in psalm 8:

You have given them **dominion** over the works of your hands; you have put all things under their feet...

And our reading from the letter to the Hebrews says that God has left nothing **beyond our control.** The question is whether control is a good thing or not.

If we're fans of a football team, then we're delighted if the striker is in control of the ball. If we're parents of children in school, then we're reassured if the teacher is in control of the subject matter and the class. If we're passengers in a car we're really pleased if the driver is in control.

On the other hand, too many people, mainly women, have been subjected to coercive control where another person tries to dominate their lives for selfish purposes. And there's the absolute domination one over another in slavery, still present today in our country today even though slavery was abolished by parliament in 1833.

Control, it seems, is neither good or bad on its own. It all depends on the context and the way it is exercised. I do wonder about our God-given dominion and control over the earth. Having control also implies responsibility. We, every single one of us, have been given responsibility by God of exercising control over this planet and everything on it.

And because the responsibility has been given to us by God, it is clear that the kind of control we should have is the kind of control that God exercises over the whole universe: not coercive, not self-seeking; not for self-interest; but loving, caring, nurturing. That sounds like a huge task. Isn't it rather unfair to place that burden on our shoulders?

Well, no, it's not unfair: God created in love for us and then gave us freewill to choose how to use or abuse the earth he had entrusted to us. If we chose well, then things would go well. It shouldn't have been a burden to us. So did we take care? Or did we lord it over the world?

In the last 150 years, particularly in the white western world, we have acted to the degradation of creation and contributed vastly to climate change with all its knock-on effects. In the last decade there have been deadly outbreaks of infectious diseases killing hundreds of thousands of people. There have been catastrophic storms, sudden floods, wildfires, heat domes, complete changes in weather patterns all leading to loss of life, destruction of property, destitution and starvation. People are fighting over scarce resources: food and water.

We do know about it, though not everything about it, and we can take steps to mitigate the catastrophe. But... Do we want that responsibility? Do we care enough? It made me think of the chap landing the plane when all his engines had been put out by birds in flight just after take-off over New York in 2016. The pilot had 155 people on board to care for—lives in his hands like it or not. He probably

wouldn't have chosen that particular responsibility but it had been given to him by virtue of his job. Having just taken off, he was flying too low to return to any airport for an emergency landing. He had to use all his skill and knowledge to land the plane safely, somewhere. And he did just that: he glided the plane and ditched in the Hudson River off midtown Manhattan, missing iconic buildings like the Chrysler Building and the Empire States Building, plus all the river traffic. Everyone was rescued.

Perhaps that's a bit like us as Christians in the world today. There are present and future lives in our hands, those of our children and grandchildren, and of children across the world. Hopefully we do at least care about them, though we may not want the responsibility for their survival placed on each of us. That, however, is not a choice. Responsibility has been trustingly given to us in love by God. It's up to us to use the skill and knowledge that we have, in as much or little as we are able to do, to 'land the plane safely'.
