Reading: Colossians 1:15-20

Jesus Christ is the image of God, the invisible one, the firstborn of all creation. For in him all things were created, in the heavens and here on the earth. Things we can see and things we cannot—thrones and lordships and rulers and powers—all were created both through him and for him.

And he is ahead, prior to all else and in him all things hold together; and he himself is supreme, the head over the body, the church. He is the start of it all, firstborn from realms of the dead; so in all things he might be the chief.

For in him all the Fullness was glad to dwell and through him to reconcile all to himself, making peace through the blood of his cross, through him yes, things on the earth, and also the things in the heavens.

This is the word of the Lord: Thanks be to God.

Talk [Rev Alison]

What a wonderful reading this morning: a great hymn of praise to Christ. A hymn that might help us to answer that question about Jesus that I wondered at the beginning.

"Who, or maybe, 'what', is Jesus?"

The great Christian writer, C S Lewis, got upset when people would say Jesus was just a good man, a teacher of wisdom. He would say, "No! That's not an option". For C S Lewis, there were only three possibilities.

Firstly, Jesus thought he was God but was actually mentally ill, having delusions of Godhead;

Second, he knew he was not God but pretended to be, conning thousands of gullible peasants;

Or third, he actually was God, just as he claimed.

Paul was in no doubt, as he said in the letter we have just heard. So what does that letter tell us?

To start with it says that Christ, Jesus, is the image of the invisible God. That sounds strange enough in itself. How can you possibly have an image of something that is invisible?

If I have a mirror, it's easy to see my own reflection in it, but impossible to see my granddaughter in it because she lives on the other side of the

country and so, as far as I am concerned, is invisible. But maybe if she was in the next-door room, with the door open, I might be able to angle the mirror somehow so that I could see her in it.

In the same way, Jesus is the mirror image of God who is there but to all intents and purposes is invisible to us.

When his disciple, Philip, said, "Lord, show us the Father". Jesus answered, "Anyone who has seen me, has seen the Father".

The more we look at Jesus, the more we will get to know the true nature of our loving God. It reminds me of those verses in the first chapter of Genesis,

So God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them.

And in the opening verses of Paul's letter, we discover that Christ, Jesus, is firstborn in creation—all things were made in him and through him and for him. It sounds like the opening verses in St John's Gospel that we hear at Christmas, when John refers to Jesus as The Word:

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being.

It's hard to imagine that Jesus was right there in some way, one with God at the beginning of time and space, and was then born on earth as a human at a particular time in a particular place. But we're told that it was so.

Jesus is supreme, first of all beings, reigning over the kings and queens of this world, over presidents and prime ministers, over generals and potentates. In fact, all of creation is held together in him. Not only is Christ, Jesus, first in creation, but he is also first in God's new creation, reigning supreme in God's kingdom.

Perhaps that makes Jesus feel rather remote, lofty, way above us all. Except that we know when he was Emmanuel, God with us, he showed love beyond measure, love that led to the cross.

Jesus revealed the invisible God to humanity; we can meet God face-toface in Jesus who is made in God's image. We too are made in the image of God, but because of the wrong things we do—our sin—our image is a bit messed up and doesn't truly reflect God. But because Jesus didn't stay dead for ever—he was first born from the dead and we celebrate his resurrection at Easter—we are brought back to God through the cross. And through the cross, we can again see God and see his image in us.

Why do we need to know about Jesus, who or what he was? Well quite simply, Christianity is about Jesus Christ. The more that we know about Jesus, the more that we will understand about God and what he's done for us.
