Old Testament Reading: Ecclesiastes 1:2, 12-14; 2:18-23

"Vanity of vanities," says the Teacher, "vanity of vanities! All is vanity."

"I, the Teacher, when king over Israel in Jerusalem, applied my mind to seek and to search out by wisdom all that is done under heaven; it is an unhappy business that God has given to human beings to be busy with.

□ New Testament Reading: Colossians 3:1-11

So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth, for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life is revealed, then you also will be revealed with him in glory.

Put to death, therefore, whatever in you is earthly: fornication, impurity, passion, evil desire, and greed (which is idolatry). On account of these the wrath of God is coming on those who are disobedient. These are the ways you also once followed, when you were living that life. But now you must get rid of all such things—anger, wrath, malice, slander, and abusive language from your mouth. Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have stripped off the old self with its practices and have clothed yourselves with the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge according to the image of its creator. In that renewal there is no longer Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave and free; but Christ is all and in all!

Gospel: Luke 12:13-21

Someone in the crowd said to Jesus, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the inheritance with me."

Jesus replied, "Man, who appointed me a judge or an arbiter between you?" Then he said to them, "Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; life does not consist in an abundance of possessions."

And he told them this parable: The ground of a certain rich man yielded an abundant harvest. He thought to himself, 'What shall I do? I have no place to store my crops.'

Then he said, 'This is what I'll do. I will tear down my barns and build bigger ones, and there I will store my surplus grain. And I'll say to myself, 'You have plenty of grain laid up for many years. Take life easy; eat, drink and be merry.'

But God said to him, 'You fool! This very night your life will be demanded from you. Then who will get what you have prepared for yourself?'

"This is how it will be with whoever stores up things for themselves but is not rich toward God."

This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**

Sermon [Belinda]

The writer of Ecclesiastes was clearly having a bad day when he wrote the passage we heard this morning. Like the Eeyore of the Old Testament he inexorably seeks out the negative in any situation and can see no positive aspect to human activity. The sort of person who makes you feel slightly worse after a social encounter. Not the sort of chap you'd want to invite round for a relaxing evening.

Even so, perhaps there are times when some of us feel almost as grim as this: the times mid-pandemic when it seemed to be never-ending, or the times when we hear yet another terrifying statistic about the extent to which human activity has damaged our planet or sent another species of animal hurtling towards extinction. Sometimes we do feel that all is futility, when it seems impossible to counteract what is happening in the world and when the things we value most are being trashed. These past few months of turbulent political activity have left many of us feeling that the bedrock of our society is being shaken with a terrible seismic force, and that integrity, truth and justice—the things we have always assumed to be essential to our democracy—are now 'unfashionable'. What chance do we have to alter anything in this downward slide towards oblivion?

Well, I believe we do have a choice today. We can agree with the Speaker that it is all a waste of time, that all our activities are pointless, no matter how well intentioned, and that giving in to despair is the only rational thing to do. Or we could look for some alternative views, and see if we can squeeze a little positivity back into our attitudes.

Last weekend I looked at my runner beans. They are very pretty with their scarlet flowers, but with the excessively dry weather that we have been experiencing the flowers were just not setting. So, there were flowers for a few days and then nothing. It's not what you plant beans for. Like many gardeners my attitude to my garden in these past couple of weeks has been pretty despairing, and to begin with I was ready to give up on the runner beans. I tried something else instead, probably based on listening to Gardeners' Question Time. I went out and sprayed the flowers, morning and evening, muttering to myself about how in this extraordinary weather this was never going to work... but it has! I can see a number of tiny beans taking shape.

It's a small victory against the overwhelming effects of the devastating heat and dryness, but it shows that my efforts with beans are not an exercise in futility. There is a glimmer of hope for the gardens—is there any for our struggling spirits, at a time of uncertainty and upheaval?

Jesus' parable about the man who built himself bigger and bigger barns to store all of his grain seems to be about the futility of human endeavour too: what's it all about? Working harder and harder, getting more and more stuff, and then dying before beginning to enjoy the fruits of our labours? Is that what human existence is for?

Jesus warns his listeners about greed, the sort of greed that can blind us to what really matters. The sort of greed that, even when we have more than

enough already, goes on wanting more and more. It's a sort of addiction and we see it in many forms today—in countries and in individuals. On a national level it is most dangerous, leading to encroaching on what rightfully belongs to others, as we have seen this year in the continuing attacks on Ukraine. On an individual level it can be more subtle, but nevertheless leads to trampling over the needs of others, becoming oblivious to the effect of our actions and more and more inward looking. In George Elliot's book about the miser, Silas Marner, it is a little baby girl who rescues him from his self-imposed isolation, an isolation brought on by his obsession with money. Who will rescue us if we get stuck in this blind alley?

We are a very rich nation, compared with the majority of the rest of the world's countries. We have all sorts of defences which cushion us from much that is happening in the world. One of the shocks we have sustained this year is the realisation that we are not immune to climate change or a war 1500 miles away, coming hot on the heels of the realisation that a virus which started in a distant place has had a devastating effect on us. None of our wealth as a country has been able to stop those harsh realities. Greed in this context is even more dangerous, making us assume that our needs are paramount and that other, lesser countries will just have to wait their turn. What is God saying to us about our attitude to the poorer countries, when we have cuts in the Overseas Aid budget at a time when there is the greatest need?

What is he saying to us as Christians about our own individual attitudes to the wealth that is ours? In the parable the rich man imagines his future life of ease, with time to eat drink and be merry, no pressures to worry about, his money keeping him well insulated against any troubles. Of course we all want to provide for our old age and ensure that we will be able to have a pleasant lifestyle, but sometimes we can become so hidebound by thinking of our own future comforts that we ignore the needs of others. We even assume our own superiority because of what we have. It is an unconscious arrogance, but we have been warned: the man who piled up treasure for himself remained a pauper in the sight of God.

When I visited Malawi, fascinating as it was, I found it very difficult to know how to reconcile my way of life, which I don't think of as particularly luxurious, with the way of life of a Malawian teacher who has to get up early to get the fire going to cook the nsima for breakfast, who works in a

school that has the majority of the classes sitting outside on the bare earth, who writes examples in chalk on the soil, using pebbles as counters and who then goes home in the afternoon to cultivate her patch of soil to grow the maize for the nsima, without which she and her family will go hungry. I don't think I know yet how I should have responded in that situation, or whether my visit did any good or any harm. It's a problem for those of us in the prosperous part of the world. And yes, in this country too there are people living hand to mouth. What do we do? Fill our barns a bit more and raise our drawbridges to make sure no one else can get in?

If we are to put on the new nature that Paul wrote to the Colossians about, what should it look like? To start with, we need to lower our defences. We need to make sure that we are listening to God and to other people, not just shored up in our own little safe place. We need to ask God in prayer about how much we should keep for ourselves and how much we should give away. We need to ask God to make us aware of the needs of other people that are staring us in the face. Perhaps we also need to bear in mind that wealth is not just to do with cash—our wealth, our security is to do with the things that make life enjoyable—our family and friends, our pets, our gardens, our pastimes, and we need to thank God every day for all of those things. If we begin to see those things as gifts that we have received, rather than a birth right that makes us better than others, maybe we will be a little more grateful and a bit less peevish. Maybe, when we begin to say thank you, we will begin to enjoy them more.

In the next part of the letter to the Colossians, in Chapter 3 verse 14, St Paul gets to the heart of the issue: 'Finally and to bind everything together and to complete the whole, there must be love.'

That is what transforms greed into generosity, changes the negative to the positive and changes futility into promise.
