## **Ministerial Musings**

The 6th of February marks the 70th anniversary of the accession of Queen Elizabeth II, her Platinum Anniversary. It is always a date tinged with sadness for the Queen because that was the date her father, George VI died. She was in Africa at the time and Prince Philip broke the news to her. She is the longest reigning monarch this country has ever had, even longer than Queen Victoria who reigned for 64 years. She has been a constant in my lifetime because although I was born in George's reign I was too young to remember it.

The Queen's reign has been one of service and a strong sense of duty. Before she became queen, on the occasion of her 21st. birthday she said in a radio broadcast, "I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong."

She is a woman of deep, personal faith, and often made reference to Jesus in her Christmas messages. In her first message in 1952 she said, "Pray for me ... that God may give me wisdom and strength to carry out the solemn promises I shall be making, and that I may faithfully serve Him and you, all the days of my life.' The Queen has always taken those promises very seriously.

Like most families, the Royal Family has had its highs and lows, but through them all, the Queen has drawn strength from her faith. She said in her Christmas message of 2014, "For me, the life of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, whose birth we celebrate today, is an inspiration and an anchor in my life. A role model of reconciliation and forgiveness, he stretched out his hands in love, acceptance and healing. Christ's example has taught me to seek to respect and value all people of whatever faith or none."

In 2011 she returned to the theme of forgiveness. "Forgiveness lies at the heart of the Christian faith. It can heal broken families, it can restore friendships and it can reconcile divided communities. It is in forgiveness that we feel the power of God's love."

May we too draw strength from the power of God's forgiveness and restoration throughout the rest of this year.

#### News From Your Local Councillors



#### Loddon Roundabout and George Lane

It has been great to have access to the new roundabout over the festive period! A taste of things to come and the benefits this new junction will bring. Unfortunately, George Lane will close again to two-way traffic, with the same one-way system as before, from 6 January 2022, so the other half of the roundabout can be built. There will be two-way traffic lights on the A146 and the Mundham Road will be closed. Work is still due to be completed by 18 March 2022.

#### Chedgrave Norwich Road/A146 junction

This dangerous junction has long been a concern for local people. Norfolk County Council have been looking at how to make safety improvements. What they have come up with so far just isn't going to be workable, as it will exacerbate tailbacks on both roads at peak times. I've asked them to go back to the drawing board and think again. What we really need, is another roundabout! I can hear you all groaning about the disruption already! It won't happen anytime soon though, roundabouts are very, expensive, however I am sticking out for this as the only real solution. Village improvements

**Hales Green Cattle Grid** – Norfolk Highways have temporarily filled in the cattle grid until the replacement grid is delivered for installation.

**Neighbourhood Watch** – The villages need a new Co-ordinator so that we can stay in the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme. This role involves about 4 hours a month to prepare and circulate the information. If you are interested in volunteering either in a group or alone for this please get in touch with Alan (<u>alanhale8@icloud.com</u>) or the Clerk for more information.

**20 MPH Speed Limit on School Lane Proposal –** We have received quite a lot of support for this but would still like to hear what you think, by email or letter. Regretfully it is not possible to make representation on the basis of Facebook postings or anonymous emails. The Parish Clerk however, is able to remove your contact details if you wish.

**Neighbourhood Planning –** Please tell us your ideas, concerns and questions, so that we can work to improve the village for everyone.

**Hales Roundabout** – Norfolk Highways have awarded a new contract for the replacement of the dead trees by the roundabout. The contract also includes ongoing maintenance and watering of the trees. We know that this has taken a long time but are grateful to those concerned for their support.

**Road Safety –** The Highway Code has changed, road users now have a greater responsibility to those more vulnerable than themselves. This involves looking out for road users who are more at risk to harm than you. Priority at junctions has also changed in favour of pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders and carriages - make sure you know the new rules.

**Litter Picking** - We are grateful to two people doing The Duke of Edinburgh's Award who have offered to complete their volunteering component by picking up litter around the village. If you are interested in volunteering around the village let the Parish Clerk know.

**Would you like to be a Councillor**? – We have a vacancy which we would like to fill with people who are passionate about where they live. The aim is to provide a voice for concerns, ideas and initiatives that could benefit the villages. We are especially seeking residents in Heckingham Park to represent this area. Full training about expectations of being a councillor is offered and time commitments vary based on your level of involvement.

# This article is repeated from last month for general interest regarding speeding in our communities in case you missed it last month and with our thanks to Langley & Hardley PC. It is an issue discussed by our teenager on page 54 of this edition. Ed.

Speed Awareness Monitoring (SAM): We mentioned in our article last month that Langley with Hardley Parish Council have the use of a SAM device which we share on a three-monthly rolling basis with Claxton PC. This device is mounted on a pole and monitors and records the speed of every vehicle passing the site and indicates the speed on a digital display. You may have seen these with a smiley or frowning face—ours just gives the speed. The theory is that most drivers do not speed intentionally and if they are remined that they are breaking the limit they will slow down. We have no authority to prosecute speeders—it is purely a gentle reminder but we get lots of data which we can analyse if we have a speeding problem.

We have five approved locations for the camera: Two on Langley Street, two at Langley Green and one in Hardley Road. The following information has been analysed from the camera data covering July and August 2021 when the SAM camera was located in Hardley Road opposite 'Whitehaven' on the entrance to the village. Over these two months, 600 cars per day entered the village. Mondays were the busiest with 700 vehicles and the weekends were only slightly lower with 550. The busiest times were from 8:00am to 4:00pm where the average is 45 vehicles per hour. The busiest weekday hour is 5:00-6:00pm, 62 cars entered the village.

The SAM dataset provides two measurements of speed. The average of all vehicles for each hour of every day—there is a lot of data!—and the speed of 85% of all the traffic. This is a more useful measurement than the average as this can be made up of some vehicles doing 15mph and others doing 45mph! The good news is that the 85 percentile speed over these two months was 25mph—the limit is 30mph. A very high proportion of all vehicles were travelling below 20mph. We can conclude from this analysis that we do not have a problem with speeding at the village entrance.

The camera will be located in Langley Street outside house number 16 on the 40mph repeater sign post from 21<sup>st</sup> December to 22<sup>nd</sup> February; six weeks in one direction and then turned round to face the other way for six weeks.

## Loddon and District Local History Group

Our November lecture saw a last minute change from the advertised lecture by Dr Hoggett who had had to cancel when a close family member tested positive for covid. At short notice Carol Webb and Elvie Herd put together an interesting alternative programme featuring a local business from the past. The lecture was based on a recorded, illustrated interview with Jim Leathers whom many remembered from his time running Loddon Garden Seed Centre after working in his family's company, Cannell and Sons. Both Carol and Elvie were able to add extra information to the many photographs they showed.

Cannell and Sons was founded in 1870 by Mr Cannell who aimed to produce seeds for farmers. He moved to a site in Chedgrave in 1903 with new buildings, even a fire station, being added later. That site was for drying and preparing the seeds for sale while land was farmed at Broome, Hardley and Langley to produce the crops for the seeds.

The company was very successful on a national level as it had regular stands at the Smithfield Show in London, the dairy show at Olympia, as well as the Norfolk Show. A new seed catalogue was produced every year too. Many local people were employed to collect and hand thresh the seeds before drying and testing them. Today the remaining buildings are used by other, smaller businesses.

Our December lecture was given by Rowena Burgess on the 'Swing Riots in Norfolk in 1830. Throughout her talk she demonstrated that rural labourers in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries were not just passive victims of change but, instead, they adapted their methods for protesting and these riots were part of that.

Before moving on to the 'Swing Riots', (so called after an anonymous letter signed 'Captain Swing'), we learnt some of the background for this unrest which was mainly centred in the agricultural counties in Eastern and Southern England. The Agricultural Revolution had made life harder and greater divisions began to appear between large landowners and workers as a result. There were some early protests but it was the introduction of threshing machines in the early nineteenth century that acted as the catalyst for more widespread protests as fewer workers were required and they showed their anger by burning large barns storing straw or grain. Farmers were the main target but sometimes clergy were singled out too.

1822 saw some machine breaking but there was greater unrest in 1830, the 'Swing Riots', when around 3000 episodes took place including arson and machine breaking. The disturbances started in Kent, moved to North East Norfolk and then to villages south of Norwich. There were repercussions as many involved were taken before local magistrates but there is evidence that some magistrates were sympathetic to the underlying problems the men faced and some even suggested that the farmers stopped using the controversial machines. Many of those indicted were found not guilty but, even so, there were 19 executions, 505 were transported (including a direct descendent of Rowena's) and many were imprisoned. In some counties the arrival of machines was delayed so protestors had gained a small victory.

## Hidden Histories — A Spotter's Guide to the British Landscape by Mary-Ann Ochota

What are the strange bumps in that field, I wonder how old that tiny cottage is, how did they manage to build all those field walls? There is a chance this book will be able to answer a range of similar questions that come to mind when you are travelling around our countryside.

Beautifully illustrated throughout it addresses the whole gamut of sights and sites across our landscape with explanations and historical detail where appropriate to expand our understanding of the islands we live on and what has made them look as they do. An excellent reference to look up something seen and equally a useful tool to suggest your own future explorations.

#### The Olive Harvest—Carol Drinkwater

I have been re-reading this, probably a reaction to viewing the tv series Carol fronted during lockdown on her life in the south of France, this and several of her other books providing, in part, the scripts for those programmes. It offers a simple view of a life lived in beautiful surroundings but sometimes strained by the vagaries of balancing the many aspects of a busy life. In particular on this occasion coping with the ill health of her husband and the fears that come with that situation. She draws in her friends, both domestic and professional who offer support and provide new strands to the story throughout. When she is walking in her grounds you can almost smell the lavender and thyme under her feet and see the bright bee eaters passing overhead.

#### The Way of the Hare-Marianne Taylor

Iconic to this part of England this book examines the sex, violence, magic, mayhem and murder associated with the many different aspects of the way we and our ancestors have viewed this creature. Mythically they were believed to possess supernatural powers. They build no home as their cousin rabbits do and live there lives above ground without even the winter coat of white the native mountain hare drapes itself with in that season to camouflage it from its hunters.

They live their lives facing threats from wild predators, man the hunter and man the 'sportsman' using dogs to run them down. We are lucky to have so many of them in the fields around us when we venture out.

## **Nature Notes**

It seems strange on the 1st of December to start this by wishing you all a very Happy New Year. Today started before dawn in our garden listening and observing the noisy pink-footed geese flying over our home and ended with them returning to their night-time roost. At the end of November, I decided to take our dog for a treat so went to Winterton. How the forces of nature have changed the coastline there. I can quite understand why the café had to be demolished as the area where it stood has vanished into the sea. What I did forget was that this time of year was when the seals gave birth, so the beach was covered with hundreds of seals with a sizable number of pups already born. Their mournful calls were resonating across the beach. We even had to circumnavigate a mother and young pup who were in the dunes on the path. Using my telescope I scanned the sea, although not rough. birds swimming on it would appear and disappear with regular occurrence, added to this that a good number of the species would be diving for food which made getting good views and identification interesting. Anyhow I quickly found a small flock of Common Scoter (a sea duck), Red Throated Divers in their winter plumage and, too my delight a flock of 20 Eider duck flew past, the males looking resplendent in their black and white plumage. By now I had a board dog so walked back to the carpark in land through the dunes. I had hope to see Sanderling, (a small wader) that inhabits sandy beaches, looking like little clockwork toys and they run along. Back at the carpark I see some flying past, so that had to do. (Since my visit the beach car park has been closed. If visiting to see the seals please keep you distance and dogs under control.)

At the beginning of November, a walk from Hardley Staithe downstream towards Limpenhoe Mill produced a stunning male Stonechat before I had even left the carpark. There was a subdued Cettis Warbler singing from amongst the reeds on the opposite bank of the Yare. I have heard Bearded Reedlings "pinging" in the reeds on several occasions but that day a beautiful male emerged on the top of a reed about six feet from me, giving me amazing views even if only for a few seconds. Also, during November, although never seen, Water Rails were very vocal during the day, their squealing piglet call giving them away, as they sulked through the reeds both at Hardley Staithe and Langley Dyke.

While volunteering at Earsham Wetland Centre clearing brambles from a tree, I suddenly became aware of a Kingfisher, which appeared a few feet in front of me, seemingly eyeballing me, before it flew off. I had been annoyed with myself earlier as I had left my binoculars in the car, and I had been trying to watch a distant Kingfisher fishing.

Well, who knows what 2022 will hold for us all, it now seems to be common knowledge that spending time out in creation is good for our wellbeing. So, whether it is watching sparrows and starlings through a window or out walking, keep your senses alert and you may be surprised and delighted by what is out there.

## **Gardening Notes**

## From the Allotment

Hopefully one of your New Year's resolutions is to grow more of your own fruit and veg. If you factor in your labour this probably won't save you money, but you can control how things are grown and avoid dousing them in chemicals. It will also give you a great deal of satisfaction. If you don't have enough garden then an allotment is the obvious choice. Now is a good time to get going as you will have time to dig over and otherwise plan and prepare before the main planting season. Allotments often become available at this time of year so for the Loddon allotments by the Mill\* then contact Emily <u>clerk@loddonpc.org.uk</u> 01508 522 020 and for the Chedgrave, Hardley Road allotments contact Hayley 01508 528310 <u>chedgrave.pc@gmail.com</u>. If none are available then they can add you to the waiting list. (\*Yes I know these are also now in Chedgrave, but that is a relatively recent development!)

Back to my main purpose. Now is the second opportunity to plant broad beans but your focus should be on getting ready for the coming year: planning, digging, mulching, and manuring. Now that cold weather is here his is also the time to prune your apples, pears and soft fruit. The RHS have some excellent guidance

https://www.rhs.org.uk/fruit/apples/pruning-made-easy so don't be daunted. Wait until the middle of summer and a hot dry spell to prune plums as they are likely to catch the silver leaf fungus in cold wet weather.



From the Garden—February starts the seed sowing season as light levels increase, I will start with black pot chillis, seed was collected from last years plants, it has moderate heat and produced lots of fruit, some of which I've frozen. Sweet peas sown in November look to have been eaten, small green shoots that appeared at Christmas have vanished, it happened last year that I had to sow a second batch, further investigation may be needed. The chrysanthemums I grew last year had a few flowers but they were a bit disappointing. I may need to start them earlier and remember to disbud them for bigger flowers. I have ordered 2 dahlias to try this year, David Howard and Thomas A Edison. Peat free compost was a big topic last year as peat based compost for gardeners will not be available from 2024. I've tried a few brands and it is totally different so I will experiment with using my own garden made compost with additions of leaf mould and vermiculite. I've seen an article on using mole hill soil for potting compost, so the arrival of a mole in our garden isn't all bad news. We installed a three bay compost bin last year, two bays for compost and one for chippings when we thinned the wood of the scrub last year, may need to add a 4th!

#### A Teenage comment on local life

For a flat, wet little village I'm still surprised by how beautiful, diverse, and adaptable Loddon (and all its glorious sister villages) can be. This goes for the population as well; I believe it's impossible to walk down the high street without some sort of friendly greeting or kind gesture from a total stranger, these interactions are hard to come by, away from the area we call home.

I would be lying if I said Loddon wasn't perfectly idyllic and pleasant, most of the time. As I'm sure you agree, it certainly isn't a rarity to see cars far exceeding the speed limits, motoring around the calm roads. Given that we have three relatively large schools, several well-used play areas, always full of young people, as well as countless youth activities, it is startling the speed at which some drivers choose to race around the quiet streets. It is too common an occurrence, that adults and children are put at serious risk due to a blatant neglect for the sanctity of life. However, it is not only the recklessness of some drivers that is the issue; there is also the overuse of vehicles. The roads of Loddon are particularly narrow, and once you consider the cars that park half on the even narrower pavements it can become a single lane road. This means that, at times, cars, buses and occasionally lorries are queued down the busy road, stationary and excreting exhaust into the clean air, as well as causing congestion and slowing traffic to a standstill. Of course, in places this cannot be helped, people need to park to get to their house and services; buses need to pass through Loddon; lorries need to perform their job. However, there are things that can be done to reduce the problem; I am fully aware that sometimes, when it's been raining for days and it's freezing cold, it feels there is no other option than to take the car three hundred metres down the road, but this is the issue: the overuse of vehicles particularly in rural areas.

So, I humbly ask you to take a second assessment and to weigh up the necessity of taking the car; if not for Loddon and its meagre population but for the planet itself. Because this -whilst obviously only a microcosm of the planet - is a prime example of the worsening of the desperate climate crisis and there is, in my opinion, no better feeling than to know you are doing your bit.
