

Ministerial Musings

Do you find it easy to accept help?

Are you the sort of person who doesn't like to "bother" others by asking them to lend you a hand?

From an early age we are encouraged to do things for ourselves. We encourage children to try things out on their own. That's important so that we grow up to be able to lead independent lives. However, throughout our lives we will find that we can't do things for ourselves. We have times during illness or injury when we find that we are helpless or at least we are not as able as we would like to be.

I used to be reluctant to accept help. I had the "I can manage outlook", but I've had to earn that it's OK to accept help and to ask when I can't do something. During my life I've been laid low with the usual sorts of illnesses that most people get and I've had a broken wrist and collar bone. I've also had chemo which many of you will know makes you feel pretty grotty.

Just before Christmas, I broke my wrist, again! Rather foolishly, I thought I could step safely off a wall. Wrong! Instead of landing on my feet, I crashed on to my side with my left arm under me, breaking my wrist. I discovered ways of doing things with one hand but there were many things I couldn't do and had to allow others to do such tasks as helping me to dress, prepare food and do my shopping.

Through March we are in the season of Lent. During this time, we might look for opportunities to lend a helping hand to those who need it. We try to follow the example of Jesus, the servant King. He came to serve and demonstrated this supremely when he washed his disciples' feet at the Last Supper. But Jesus also allowed others to serve him. On one occasion, a woman anointed his feet with expensive perfume, much to the chagrin of the disciples. Jesus didn't stop her. He allowed her to perform an intimate act of love for him. Mary Magdalene, Joanna and Susanna provided for Jesus out of their own resources and Simon of Cyrene carried his cross.

When we help others, Jesus acts through us. By accepting help, we are allowing Jesus to act through our helpers. This Lent, I hope we will find opportunities to serve and to be served.

You are welcome to join us at any of our services

Holy Communion is celebrated every Sunday at one or other of the Chet Valley Churches: either Book of Common Prayer (BCP) or Common Worship, with an informal Holy Communion service once a month in Chedgrave.

Morning Worship is held regularly in Loddon and Hardley.

Evening Prayer (BCP) is on the third Sunday of the month in Sisland.

XPRESSIONS CAFÉ is on the first Sunday of the month at All Saints Chedgrave. This is a relaxed and contemporary way of 'doing church'. Open between 10:00am and 12:00 noon you can come and go as you please for coffee, cake, discussion, crafts, games, stories, reflection and much more.

If you are dealing with a medical emergency, please dial 999. If appropriate, you will be directed to the nearest available defibrillator and will be given the access code. You will not be able to access the defibrillator without the code. Sometimes a defibrillator is not available because it is undergoing service/ maintenance such as new batteries or pads in which case, you will be directed to the next nearest available unit. Please contact the parish clerk with any queries during normal working hours.

Pits Play Area: The council apologies for the ongoing works to the play area and is hopeful that it will be resolved soon.



LTC 2024-25 Budget: In addition to its extensive statutory governance, management and administrative responsibilities, LTC provides services and projects for the benefit of Loddon residents, including Christmas lights, Community Larder, Staithe toilets, Love Loddon Community Group, Neighbourhood Plan, Allotments, Playing Fields, Tennis Courts, Skate Park and Play Areas and events such as the Coronation Celebration. These are coordinated by a dedicated group of councillors, volunteers and a small staff team. To fund these things, the council also receives income from grants, the Staithe toilets, facilities and allotments. However LTC's main income is the LTC precept*. LTC has agreed a precept of £183,500 for 2024-25. The precept has been held at only a small or zero increase for the last three years. Even though LTC has made savings of £25,000 across its 2024-25 budget, due to inflationary pressures, the council is increasing the LTC precept this year. The increase means an extra 53p per week for a council tax band D property. Please contact us for further information.



Notes from Sisland

Members of Sisland PCC have, like many others, started to discuss and plan events and activities that we would like to hold later in the year. At Sisland we are hoping to run the very successful Sunday afternoon teas throughout August. I often reflect on the words that I have written in previous pieces and looking at those for March I have been struck by how often I am either talking of the weather (the text for

For those who have visited the church over the last few months you will have noticed that the church tower needs some work to the wooden slats, both to the front and side. We will start to focus on fundraising for this and there will more details in due course so please continue to look out for those. The costs are not just in the works, but the scaffolding required to undertake it. We are waiting on some updated figures to give us an indication of both costs and timescales.

Sisland Church will continue to be open throughout the year. Even if the door is closed it will be unlocked, so please take the opportunity to visit us if passing, for a moment of reflection.





Chet Neighbourhood Plan

The Chet Neighbourhood Plan (CNP) is out for Regulation 16 consultation, indicating that it has regard to national planning policy. It sets a framework for future development in Loddon and Chedgrave, up to 2038, and contributes to achieving sustainable development.

If successful, CNP will be one of the main factors in determining planning applications, together with the Local Plans produced by South Norfolk Council (SNC) and The Broads Authority (TBA). It will also mean that Loddon and Chedgrave councils will receive 25% of all Community Infrastructure Level (CIL) payments made to SNC with each planning application attracting CIL. This funding would be spent in the relevant parish.

SNC and TBA have published the CNP for consultation, which closes at 5:00pm, 15th March 2024. You can see and comment on the plan by visiting: CNP webpage (www.southnorfolkandbroadland.gov.uk/neighbourhoodplans); Loddon Library (31 Church Plain, Loddon); or SNC (The Horizon Centre, Broadland Business Park, Peachman Way, Norwich, NR7 0WF) by appointment (Tel 01508 533805).

Once consultation has closed, SNC and TBA will appoint an independent qualified examiner to assess the CNP and any submitted comments. The examiner will produce a report setting out findings and recommendations. The councils will decide whether they are satisfied with the examiner's recommendations and then publish their decision, setting out whether the CNP will be submitted to a referendum, with or without modifications.

Loddon and District Local History Group

The December talk by Mary Fewster, titled 'Christmas Past', covered an historical assortment of facts about Christmas through the ages. The origins of some of our Christmas celebrations can be traced back to much earlier times. It was believed that spirits lived in evergreen plants and wished to be brought into the house. The tradition of picking holly and mistletoe for our houses derives from these earlier times. When the Christian church adopted mid-winter festivities, King Alfred decreed that there should be 12 days of feasting after Christmas.

Mary then described some of the food eaten starting with frumenty which is cracked wheat porridge cooked in almond milk. Sometimes fruit was put in and it became plum porridge. The Christmas pudding we enjoy today evolved from this. Boar hunting was an important pastime and a boar's head was the central feature of the feast once it had been decorated with bay and rosemary. Suckling pig with capers was popular too. Sweet dishes made of marzipan and sugar were enjoyed as were mince pies made of minced meat and fruit.

Some Christmas activities were then outlined by Mary. Margaret Paston's letters mention backgammon, chess and cards being played at tables and it is known that people dressed up and played music. Mummers performed plays like *George and the Dragon* in some areas. Medieval customs involved electing a servant to be the 'King of Christmas' who then had to be served by the master.

In the mid 17th century Christmas came under attack from a strict religious group called the Puritans who saw Christmas as a pagan festival with no biblical basis. In 1644 they were powerful enough to ban Christmas until Charles II reinstated it when he returned as King in 1660. After this some more familiar traditions developed.

By the late 18th century turkeys and geese were being bred for Christmas meals and carols were being sung in church again to musical accompaniments. In the 19th century Christmas trees and Christmas cards became popular particularly for the better-off. Poor industrial workers were often required to work over the Christmas period as the machines needed to be kept running. Pantomimes became popular and in 1823 'Cinderella' was performed in Norwich. Toy theatres became popular and toys in general started to be produced more. Tom Smith produced the first crackers and Caley's was one of the firms that supplied them. In 1919 King's College, Cambridge introduced a Christmas Eve Carol Service which is still held today.

The Christmas traditions that we are familiar with today had slowly fallen into place. An informative talk.

Nature Notes

Today is Tuesday 6th of February and I really must get on with March's Nature Notes if I am to reach the publishing deadline. Once again I have started a new list of birds seen or heard and have already passed 100. In years gone by with trips to North Norfolk I would have been near 150 by now, but I am pleased and content with what I have seen this year.

Over the last weekend while working on our vegetable patch I was serenaded by a robin singing its heart out only about a metre from me. The photo of the sunlight catching its red breast didn't do the whole experience justice. I have heard robins singing even on the most windy mornings before dawn since early January. This past week they have been joined by dunnocks and a song thrush, the latter not yet in full song but seemingly just warming up, but all gladdening the heart as I take the dogs on their early morning walk up the road. This joined with some glorious sunrises which have been magnificent, do lift the spirit and start the day well.

A walk round Sisland Carr a couple of weeks ago gave me some wonderful views of goldcrests flitting through the undergrowth on their search for insects. Nearing the end of the walk, I heard a nuthatch call. I think the dogs thought I was mad as we walked back and forth scanning the tops of the trees for what was about five minutes before I was rewarded with a glorious view of this blue and orange bird.

Walking from The Pits by Chedgrave Church down to the River Chet I thought I would stop and look up the dyke in the vague hope of seeing a kingfisher. I didn't believe my good fortune as there sitting in the willow bush was a kingfisher. Reaching the path that runs along the Chet to Chedgrave Common there was a little egret with its big yellow feet hunting through the flooded field. It flushed a common snipe that flew off on its zig-zag flight path.

Recently on really windy days I will take the dogs to Langley Dyke to walk along the wooded side as it is sheltered, so there is a better chance of seeing smaller birds. This has proved to be true, and I have been entertained by mixed tits flocks; I always love watching long tailed tits as they flit from branch to branch seeking food. Their long tails and small roundish bodies fascinate me and their black, white and pink colouration brings me pure joy. Also, amongst these flocks have been goldfinch, chaffinch and siskin, the latter being a small green and black finch which is attracted to alder cones. On the last two days I have also seen amongst them an overwintering chiff chaff.

Other recent highlights have been a northern diver at Hamilton Docks Lowestoft and long tailed duck at Benacre Broad along with goldeneye. I think it was a barn owl I saw at Hardley Staithe near the end of January that was my 100th bird this year. It is sad that round here they are now few and far between, having been so common in past years.

Spring is coming so get out and enjoy.

Gardening Notes

Fruit and Veg from Scratch

I promised last month that I'd start a series from scratch for anyone thinking of growing fruit and vegetables, whether in an allotment or garden or even indoors. This first part is thinking about the constraints in your life that limit what you can do: work, children, health, disability, lack of money or even the smallest garden. Worst of all no one in your family really likes vegetables though most people like fruit at least!

You won't really save money, particularly if you count your time. Likely your hourly pay rate will buy you more fruit and vegetables than the same hour spent growing them.

Don't expect to be self-sufficient without a large area of land to grow cereals and keep animals for their protein and manure.

Your own fruit and vegetables will not look so perfect or be so blemish free.

But all this comes with a different price tag. You don't know what has been applied to create those perfect fruit and vegetable on display or the damage that has been done to the environment, so I'll focus on organic growing which is hardly unusual as it's the way it was done for millennia.

There is a magic to starting with a seed and ending up with something to eat. The mental and physical well-being from gardening is widely understood, so if you really want to then it's worth finding a way that suits your circumstances.

Next time micro veg, simple salads and herbs.

From the Garden

The storms from the South and West have been playing skittles with my potted trees. Our garden is quite small so the trees I grow from seed live in pots, a type of movable arboretum. The tallest pines have had to be secured to posts to stop them going over.

Frost has bitten some of the early self-seeded plants of Cerinthe major 'Purpurescens'. From May to August they have such fantastic drooping blue and purple flowers that the bees love. I allow them to seed around, pulling out those I don't want.

At the bird feeders, dunnocks, blackbirds, pigeons, blue tits, robin and wren were busy family planning in this morning's bright sunlight.

The Bramley Apple tree had a pruning. That evening we undertook a mini Wassail for it. Wassailing is a tradition dating back at least to Elizabethan times. It seeks to banish evil spirits and give thanks to and encourage the fertility of the tree by hanging toast in the branches and pouring a libation of mulled apple juice around the roots, drinking a toast and singing traditional songs. Mostly I have been tiding up dead stems, weeding and pulling out quaking grass seedlings, I've wrestled out several large ferns and divided them. Not much is happening except there are now primroses and snowdrops flowering, small but significant flowers heralding the start of spring.

End Piece

Mediaeval Glass

Imagine being exposed to the elements for centuries and then suffering the indignity of vandals' stones smashing you. That is a potted history of the mediaeval stained glass east window at All Saints Church, Chedgrave.

Eighteen people recently visited Devlin Plummer Stained Glass in Great Moulton to view the impressive progress the company is making in repairing and conserving the window. Aaron guided us by using our glass, laid out on tables and a large lightbox. Undamaged glass is cleaned with soft brushes and gentle swabbing with pure water. Smashed panes, tricky jigsaws, are repaired using resin adhesive that can be coloured to blend with the glass. Missing fragments are replaced with specially-cut new pieces of glass, which are discretely marked so future historians will know who did the work. Once the glass is restored, it is fitted back into the lead *cames* and waterproofing compound makes a seal between it and the lead.

The cost of the repair work is covered by insurance, but to protect our window for the future against the elements and vandals, we are having an internally ventilated protective glazing system fitted. That is expensive. We are grateful to the many individuals, sister All Saints churches, companies, and the Norfolk Churches Trust for very generous financial support.
