Ministerial Musings

In the weeks after Easter, I have the joy and the privilege of preparing young people for Confirmation. The joy, the privilege, and the challenge! The word 'Confirmation' comes from the Latin word *confirmatio* which means 'to be strengthened'. The strengthening is done by the Holy Spirit, and it is done particularly for us able to be able to witness. Strengthened in order to witness to our faith: that is the heart of Confirmation – and that is the challenge! To witness to our faith in a world that does not always accept or understand faith, and does not always make a great deal of effort to do so! Sometimes it may seem as if the strengthening is needed more today than ever before; sometimes it may seem as if our young people will need that strengthening of the Holy Spirit more than any previous generation!

But if we look back to the example of the very first Christians, in those weeks following the first ever Easter, we can see perhaps that the problems and challenges they faced were not so different from our own. Peter and the first disciples were told in no uncertain terms, by the authorities, to stop preaching the Gospel. They were, to use the modern phrase, cancelled! How did they respond? They responded of course with prayer - that's the first good example to follow. And what did they pray for? They didn't pray for diplomacy, for the ability to preach without ruffling any feathers, or to be able to soft-soap the Gospel so that no-one would be offended. They prayed for boldness. 'Lord, grant to your servants to speak your word with all boldness!' (Acts 4:29) - and that's the second good example. The Christian message is one that our world needs to hear loudly and clearly, today just as it was in the first days of the Church. Let's pray then, both for our young people and for ourselves, that the Good News of God's redeeming love is heard 'with all boldness' this Eastertide! God bless you all Fr Andrew



Loddon revamp: I have been having discussions with the planners who did the revamp of Harleston last year. I am hoping that they may come up with some exciting ideas for the middle of Loddon to make it more pedestrianfriendly and to enhance the views of the Church and the lovely buildings we have around Church Plain. Staithe Footbridge: I know that the sad state of the footbridge over the Chet at the Loddon Staithe has been a subject of discussion for many years. Notes from Sisland

The weather has definitely been changeable, some beautiful early sun and warmth has been exchanged for something much fresher and breezier as I write this. Hopefully a later Easter will bring us all the change to rest and recharge the batteries. Thank you to all who supported the second-hand book sale at St Mary's on the Bank Holiday Monday. We were delighted with the number of donations as well as those who both provided help and visits on the day.

May, in Sisland, is the ideal opportunity to visit Sisland Carr. A small wood of mixed trees and managed by the Woodland Trust. There are a couple of paths which circulate around the trees and make for a very pleasant stroll. The wood contains

a conifer plantation as well as some stunning mature beech and oak. The site has also recorded some locally rare moths and noctule bats and you can often see rabbits and deer. If you visit you will be able to see the fenced plots which are being used to assess the impact of the deer and rabbits on the vegetation and regeneration of the undergrowth. At this time of year, the area is known for its stunning display of bluebells and in previous years these have been highlighted by some of the national newspapers for the stunning display. A true carpet of vivid colour. There is road access up to Sisland Carr and a small car park, but, as many will be aware, the access road is quite variable, so care is required.

May is also an important month for St Mary's as we are hoping to hold our Annual Friends Service on Sunday 15th May at 5pm, which will be a service of Evening Prayer from the Book of Common Prayer. This provides us an opportunity to say thank you to the Friends of St Marys. As well as an opportunity to update members on the work that has been undertaken in the previous twelve months and to discuss planned work required on the tower. If you would like to know more about the Friends of St Marys, which is an organisation which supports the work of preserving and maintaining the building, then please contact me for further information. As well as an annual service we also have an annual newsletter, usually produced around Christmas, to keep everyone up to date with work planned as well as other events in the village.

BEYOND NO MOW MAY

Once again Plantlife are asking us to leave our lawns uncut throughout May to give a boost to our early pollinators. If you have done this before then you will probably have more wildflowers (and bees and butterflies) this year. The next step is to simply count the flowers in a square metre patch of lawn in the last week in May and Plantlife tell you how much nectar they're producing and how many bees they'll feed with your own Personal Nectar Score - www.plantlife.org.uk/everyflowercounts/

The science coming out of repeating this national survey year after shows:

- The highest production of flowers and nectar sugar is on lawns cut every 4 weeks. This gives 'short-grass' plants I daisies and white clover a chance to flower in profusion, boosting nectar production tenfold.
- Areas of longer unmown grass were more diverse in their range of flowers, with other nectar-rich plants like oxeye daisy, field scabious and knapweed increasing the range of nectar sources for different pollinators and extending nectar availability into late summer.
- Every Flower Counts found 80% of lawns would support around 400 bees a day from the nectar sugar produced by flowers such as dandelion, white clover and selfheal. But 20% of lawns (dubbed "superlawns") supported 10 times as many up to 4000 bees a day. Which are you?

The Chet Valley B-Line (CVBL) (see <u>http://berghaptonconservationtrust.org/</u>) is a local organisation trying help reverse the decline in pollinators, essential to our food supplies, by creating a pollinator friendly corridor from Poringland to the Yare. Almost 100 sites large and small are now registered. We completed the EFC survey on some patches of land left uncut over the summer by Lod-don and Chedgrave PCs, South Norfolk Council and Saffron Housing Trust and found flowers to support over 30,000 bees.

The good news is **YOU** can help:

Avoid harmful pesticides and herbicides Plant pollinator friendly flowers (lists on our website or at the RHS) Provide a home - a patch of long grass and a source of fresh water




Holiday Club Advance Notice

Norfolk Home Library Service

Norfolk home library expands service and calls for new users and volunteers.

Calling all book lovers and digital masters! A popular home library service delivered by Royal Voluntary Service and the Norfolk Library and Information Service is looking to expand throughout Norfolk.

A new digital inclusion program is also being trialled, in which specially trained volunteers teach the service's clients how to access critical information digitally, and how to download books online. The expansion means that the Home Library Service is looking to welcome new clients, volunteers, and Volunteer Coordinators to the team.

Volunteers work alongside their local library to select and deliver books and other media to those who may find it difficult to leave the house, have mobility issues, or caring responsibilities. The service also provides regular, friendly social contact to check if clients are safe and well, to discuss reading and listening preferences, and to report any concerns to appropriate services as needed.

Volunteer Coordinators liaise with local libraries, manage a network of local volunteers to arrange book deliveries, recruit new volunteers, and build relationships with local community groups to promote the service. As part of the new digital inclusion program, Digital Service Coordinators may offer their skills in workshops to train volunteers to use various devices, apps, and programs that the service's clients may find challenging.

Alicia Stillman, Service Manager for Royal Voluntary Service Norfolk Home Library Service says: "For people who find leaving their homes problematic, the Home Library Service offers a vital link to the local library and a welcome connection with a friendly face. The Covid-19 pandemic has shone a light on the significant number of vulnerable adults living in isolation. During the last two years, it has also become apparent that many socially isolated people were not able to access vital information due to digital illiteracy. Instruction on downloading eBooks, accessing GP and Council services, and setting up video conferencing can often be more easily explained in person, in an informal setting, one on one. Through the new digital inclusion program, with the help of our dedicated volunteers, we hope to bring clients back to the activities they love, prevent further isolation, and provide companionship and support."





Loddon and District Local History Group

>Dr Marsden gave the March lecture, titled 'Great Yarmouth 17th Century Tokens and their Issuers'. To give the context for this informative lecture he, firstly, outlined the economic background of post medieval England regarding the payment of goods. A coin system using small silver tokens, worth their weight in silver, had been introduced but not enough were being produced and the situation became critical during the period 1649-1672 (the Protectorate and then the early part of Charles the second's reign). As a result local Issuers made their own cheaper (nickel) versions. Norfolk had 300 such Issuers and 46 of these were in Yarmouth.

> These tokens were all small farthings, (2/3 inch), with a name, a symbol to represent the issuer's occupation and location. Some have initials and some a date. The earliest is 1652, the latest 1667 when Great Yarmouth corporation banned private tokens and issued their own until 1669. These were a little larger with the Town's Arms, date and inscription 'For the use of the poor'. In 1670 King Charles cancelled use of all tokens, invoking his royal prerogative as the sole issuer of coins.

> We were shown many enlarged pictures of the tokens and Dr Marsden explained what each token told us about the issuer, many of whom were bakers. To supplement the information on the tokens he used documentary sources such as baptism, marriage, burial and apprenticeship records. Town books of Yarmouth were also useful, they outlined decision making by the corporation. Wills and probate inventories were used as well as the tombstones in St Nicholas' graveyard (e.g., John Arnold, a bailiff and token issuer between 1658-60 was buried here).

> The Corporation of Great Yarmouth was composed of 2 bailiffs, 20 Aldermen and 42 Common Council men. All needed to be free men and this freedom could be gained by either serving an apprenticeship, by birth, by purchase or by gift of the corporation. This freedom was also needed in order to trade and to issue tokens. Joseph Ames gained his freedom by being apprenticed to his father.John, while Edward Peterson bought his freedom in 1669 by paying £10 (probably equivalent to £10,000 today). Changes in political leadership meant Puritans were brought in to replace some corporation members in the 1650s only for the reverse to happen when the new King wanted Royalists in positions of power.

Dr Marsden concluded his interesting talk by stating that most of these tokens remained within twelve miles from their place of origin showing that poor people did not move around much in the seventeenth century.

Nature Notes

The beginning of May, we will be well into Spring and the dawn chorus will be vibrant most of the summer visiting birds. Screaming Swifts should be with us soon, they only land on their nests. The rest of their life they spend flying.

I am writing this back in April on a cold overcast day, nevertheless, Chiff Chaffs have arrived and calling. There has also many more Garganey seen both locally and nationally this year, a small attractive duck that visits these shores to breed. I catch up with a pair at Carlton Marsh reserve on the outskirts of Lowestoft, run by Suffolk Wildlife Trust and well worth a visit. It has a new visitor centre, including a children's outside play area. They've also turned an area of grazing marsh into scrapes (pools of water) which can be very productive, in fact I heard today there were two Black Necked Grebes and a Siberian Chiff Chaff, if I had time, I would have gone to see them.

We had warmer weather in March, and it is encouraging to see so many signs of Spring and new life emerging everywhere. Hawthorn beginning to show green as its leaves break out of their buds, Blackthorn bushes clothed in white blossom, yellow primroses add colour everywhere. Hares are more evident in the fields, butterflies are out and about, at least Yellow Brimstone, Comma, Tortoiseshell and Peacock along with a variety of bees and other insects. Lots to see and enjoy.

Back in February a rare American Ring Necked Duck, turned up on a reservoir at Leiston. The instructions read "walk South a quarter of a mile, Southeast a quarter of a mile then climb the Sycamore tree!! Surprisingly the directions were accurate, and the tree must have been designed for climbing. I could see a flock of Tufted Duck at the far end, fortunately making their way towards me. I was joined by a fellow bird watcher and we were able to pick out the American vagrant from its European cousins. As well as the Ring Necked Duck, we also located two Greater Scaup - more often found on the sea. The sycamore proved to be a great viewing platform. Returning home via Minsmere a was able to see a pair of Smew, another duck, the male of which is stunning in its white and black lined plumage.


A duck that has been spotted around the arable fields near Hardley Flood are Shelducks. These large ducks nest down rabbit holes, both the male and female have a red bill and vivid plumage of mainly white and black with a chestnut bib.

Hopefully as you read this we may have seen our first cuckoo of 2022 and enjoying sunny weather during the bank holiday weekend!

Gardening Notes

From the Allotment—Andrew Milner

There is always plenty to do in May, first and second sowings, thinning out crops (don't leave carrot thinning's lying around as the smell attracts carrot fly), earthing up potatoes, but standing ready to provide protection if the weather suddenly turns frosty. With an eye to the weather, you can also set out young plants from the greenhouse-courgettes, pumpkins and squash, hold back a little longer on sweet potatoes. Put in any supports that plants need. Keep on weeding of course and enjoy the first fruits of your labour – peas, rhubarb and lettuce should all be ready.

I have written before about the many uses of Russian Comfrey – liquid feed, mulch and soil improver I recently found out there is a Norfolk Comfrey Symphytum x norvicense. The main difference are its pale blue-white flowers. Comfrey is good for flowering crops e.g. tomatoes, beans and soft fruits, but crops that are primarily green leaves like spinach, chard or lettuce would prefer a feed made from nettle tops. Avoid roots and never put them in your compost. This is easy to make in a bucket. Pack with nettles and fill with water when it seriously pongs dilute and use.

Still got over wintered crops? You need to finish these and prepare for new . Last chance now to sow parsnips and main crop peas.

From the Garden—Shirley Cross

May is a busy month and as frost danger passes it's time to plant out bedding and tender plants such as dahlias, geraniums and cannas. Check supports for tall plants, delphiniums, lupins and hollyhocks. Plant and tie in sweet peas as they grow, pinch out tips as you plant them and



they will bush out and give more blooms. If you want long straight stems then remove the tendrils, but you will need to tie in more regularly. Lift and divide large clumps of spring bulbs and divide primroses, remembering to give all spring bulbs a liquid feed to build up the bulbs for next year's flowers. Seeds that can be sown this month for flowering next year are foxgloves, delphiniums and primulas. The tender Chrysanthemums I tried last year didn't flower as well as I had hoped, I brought them into the greenhouse in October, so I may need to bring them in earlier this year. Hardy varieties did much better, I will look to plant a few more of these. A flower becoming very popular again is Xerochrysum once known as Helichrysum until 1990, common name is straw flower, they have a range of colours, are good for cutting and can also be dried for winter indoor displays, it is years since I have grown them so maybe squeeze an extra tray in the greenhouse!
